t the Schiphol Airport in Amsterdam, a facsimile of a fly is baked at the bottom of the urinals in the men's room. These flies, nudging people to improve their aim, have ended up preventing spillage by 80%, saving more than 8% of the cleaning budget. This nudge, however, is not accidental. In fact, it is psychologically engineered to "attract people's attention and alter their behaviour in a positive way without actually requiring anyone to do anything at all", as per Richard Thaler and Cass Sunstein, the two American scholars who popularised the concept of this nudge theory.

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Nudging towards a better society

A concept used in multiple sectors like social psychology, consumer behaviour, behavioural economics, science, and policy etc., the nudge stands to be the perfect example of libertarian paternalism. It allows people the freedom to choose, simply nudging them towards the rational choice. When presented with apple slices vs small pieces of cake, people unconsciously turned towards healthier choices, as concluded from an experiment by iNudgeYou; the average intake of apple increased 60.8% and the intake of cake decreased by 34%

within two days. Presented as a 'free choice', the effects of nudge theory were seen in effect during the COVID-19 pandemic. One whiff of the virus and the entire world had started paying immediate attention to proper handwashing - with soap, scrubbing every finger, and for at least 20 seconds. A survey published in Plos One

showcased that more than 95% Eu-

ropeans started washing their hands properly after the pandemic than they did before. Even the white lines drawn at the S shaped curves at Lake Shore Drive in Chicago have nudged the accident rate to fall by 36%, creating a safer and better world for everyone without compromising on essentials.

Nudging towards a better governance

The subtle impact of the theory has been so monumental that governments all around the world are not only using them to bring a change in their subjects, but also themselves. Former UK PM David Cameron and US president Barack Obama recognised its power and sought to employ nudge theory to advance their domestic policy goals in their countries. In fact, Obama employed one of the original innovators of the theory, Cass Sunstein, as the administrator of the Office of Information and Regulatory Affairs to ensure maximum results. The UK, too, created a British Behavioural Insights Team aka Nudge Unit in 2010 with the help of David Halpern with the aim of generating and applying behavioural insights following the principals of nudge theory. The country also depended on it for 'herd immunity', and even Australia has created an official Nudge

Unity in 2012 and Behavioural Economics Team of Australia in 2016 for applying insights to public policy.

Nudging towards criticism

Though it all sounds great in theory and seems a revolutionary step to take, its remarks are not all sunshine and rainbows. Being deemed as 'limited' in its effectiveness, even big names like The King's Fund have asked the society to rather work on sure solutions than just nudging, if the plan is to bring change. With charges that claim that nudging diminished autonomy, threatens dignity, violate liberties, and reduces welfare, ethicists claim for it to be manipulative, even bordering classic conditioning. Besides, a research by David Tannenbaum found that governments using nudging only believe it to be ethical and functionary when it aligns with their own political leanings.

Some researches claim it to be the ultimate step of waving in change, vet some claim that the ethicality of nudges are susceptible to partisan bias. In the midst of it all, the theory stands, and the world with it, deciding to what extent should it be employed and when it should be rejected. What do you think?

Baguettes acquire UNESCO cultural heritage status

celebration of the French way of life, because "there's nothing more quintessentially French than the

baguette itself."

Chinese surveillance cameras banned

In order to reduce potential security risks, the government on Nov

24, 2022, directed its departments to put a definite halt on the installation of China-made security cameras in sensitive areas. The move has been made keeping in mind the fact that Chinese companies, especially Hikvision and Dahua, are the biggest suppliers of CCTV cameras deployed by the British administration, and are believed to have been involved in aiding human rights abuses against Uyghurs in Xinjiang. Both the companies, however, have denied the allegations.





C PAKISTAN

General Asim Munir elected as new army chief

The nation's erstwhile spy chief, General Asim Munir, on Nov 29, 2022, took charge as the new army chief, replacing General Qamar Javed Bajwa, who served two consecutive terms in the office. With his election, General Munir has become the first army chief in the history of the nation to have headed both of its powerful intelligence agencies, Inter-Services Intelligence (ISI) and Military Intelligence (MI). His stint in the former, however, lasted for only 8 months, the shortest ever.



USA

Monkeypox rechristened as mpox by WHO

The WHO has renamed monkeypox to 'mpox', after having received multiple requests to do the same. The move came in response to the racist language that was used online and in other settings when the outbreak of monkeypox spread rapidly around the world earlier in May. Though both the names will continue to be used for the next one year or so, the original one will be completely discarded post that.



EQUATORIAL GUINEA

President Teodoro Obiang wins sixth term

Obiang Mbasogo, the world's longest-serving president, has been re-elected to the president's office for the sixth time, extending his 43-year rule. Having received 94.9% votes, Obiang defeated Andres Esono and Buenaventura, the two opposing candidates. The nation has only had two presidents since independence, Obiang being one of them.



INDIA

PSLV rocket launches nine satellites

In a bid to monitor the oceans, ISRO, in partnership with the Ministry of Earth Sciences, launched its Polar Satellite Launch Vehicle rocket, with a one-ton EOS-6 and eight nanosatellites aboard. Having blasted off from the Satish Dhawan Space Centre, it is said to be ISRO's final space mission for 2022. The mission also acts as a follow up to OceanSat-1 and OceanSat-2 launched in 1999 and 2009 respectively.



🗮 AUSTRALIA

Endangered status for Great Barrier Reef

UN made its plans to add the Great Barrier Reef to the list of endangered UNESCO World Heritage Sites public, citing Australia's inadequate attempts at protecting it. The nation, however, has opposed the move, for its implementation would remove it from the World Heritage List altogether. To be certain, the government's reportedly in serious talks with the conservation experts at UNESCO.


Understanding crypto


Book Review Rake in that review



atherine Freese is known for her work in theoretical cosmology at the interface of particle physics and astrophysics. One of the first to propose ways to discover dark matter, Freese was born on February 8, 1957. Currently serving as a professor of physics at the University of Texas, Austin, she began her illustrious educational journey at Princeton University and was one of the first women to major in physics from this prestigious institution. She then obtained her MA from Columbia University, a PhD from the University of Chicago, and a postdoctoral fellowship from Harvard University.

She has been constantly working to identify dark matter and dark energy that permeates the universe as well as to build a successful model for the early universe immediately after the Big Bang. Freese is also known as the founder in the field of calculations for SUSY (Supersymmetric) particles and WIMP (Weakly Interacting Massive Particles). In fact, one of her experiments between MACHO (massive astrophysical compact halo object) and WIMPs ruled out MACHO dark matter in favour of WIMPs. She also proposed a model known as the 'Cardassian Expansion', in which dark energy is replaced with a modification of Einstein's equations. Besides, Katherine proposed a new

theoretical type of star, commonly referred to as a dark star, powered by dark matter annihilation rather than fusion. And, at present, is working on the evolution of these dark stars and their role in the cosmic space. Moving a step further, Freese is investigating the future of universe and at the same time, working on a new approach to study inflationary cosmology -'Chain Inflation'.

For her revolutionising work, Freese has received multiple honours over the years, including an Honorary Doctorate (Honoris Causa) from the University of Stockholm in the year 2012, and Julius Edgar Lilienfeld Prize from the American Physical Society (APS) in 2019.


he artist: Mexican artist Frida Kahlo (July 6, 1907 – July 13, 1954) was best known for painting a series of self-por-

rom unequal pay scale to "Oh, you are not good enough for this," the prejudice against women still lingers in the 21st century. Gender equality, as a cause, was adopted by the UN and was placed fifth in the list of 17 Sustainable Development Goals, with 2030 as the deadline set to realise it. However, the progress on the said matter has failed to move forward as intended. Currently, women amount for a majority of the world's unpaid labour,

meaning that even when they are sowing the seeds, they do not reap the benefits. According to International Labour Organisation, women in the Asia-Pacific region perform 76.2% of total hours of unpaid care tasks as compared to men, and the actual value of this unrecognised contribution is equivalent to 9% of the global GDP - almost 11 trillion USD. Besides, as per the latest statistics mentioned in UN Women report, it will take another 286 years to compose legal frameworks, and enforce and monitor gender equality in public life. In



2020, women represented nearly 45% of global employment losses, and up to 10 million more girls are likely to become child brides by 2030 due to COVID-19 pandemic. With such eye-opening facts, it seems like we have neglected women long enough. So, it's time to take bold steps to accelerate the progress and achieve the goal.GT


The redemption


