
What are the essential qualities that a budding journalist should possess? Undoubtedly, a budding journalist should take interest in the society. Be it any kind of journalism (political, environmental, social etc.), one needs to be in tune with the latest developments in the society. A budding journalist should associate, empathise and relate with the surroundings.

As a journalist, what is the best way for propagating women empowerment in India?

Education. I have done special shows on women. And what I have garnered from them is, women need to be made aware about their position in the society. I have been to Iran and women there enjoy liberty at home but not outside. Here, in India, women are liberal but we need to empower them.

Describe your journey as a female journalist.

I have loved every bit of my journey so far. It has sustained me through all these years. It is my source of bread



and butter. Besides, journalism gives me my space when I feel lonely. This profession has helped me learn and grow. Every time I'm in the studio or out reporting, it is a new experience for me. Something I like about this profession is that it is not monotonous.

What is your first reaction when you come across cases of atrocities against women?

It is definitely humiliating. And this is something not new. Ten years back too, women were subjected to such

humiliation. I would request women to raise their voice if they want to see any change in the society.

How beneficial is reading to be a successful journalist?

Reading is the most important thing. Journalism is not a glamorous profession; it requires a lot of hard work. It is important to stay abreast with the recent developments. The more you read, the more you know and the more you report.

What are your views on the education system prevalent in India?

It is good but it needs to be overhauled. Teachers should be trained in such a manner that they are able to make the classroom more interactive. The children need to be adept at the practical application of the concepts taught in school.

What is your message for the youth? Love your country and take pride in being an Indian. We need to work together for its development. GII

It's time for a revolution in education




The Fault in Our Stars
