


Diverse options

study conducted by Word Health Organisation shows that one in five Indians may suffer from depression in their lifetime, which means a staggering 200 million people. Depression, however, is just one of the many mental illnesses that continue to affect world populace at large. Generalised Anxiety Disorder, Atten-Deficit/Hyperactivity Disorder, Bipolar Disorder, and Schizophrenia are some mental disorders. The gravity of the problem is much higher than we realise. Amity Institute of Psychology and Allied Sciences (AIPS), AUUP, Noida commenced its journey towards solving this problem that could prove to be the biggest deterrent towards the growth of a country.

The problem

Mental health is already a grave issue. However, what makes things worse are the taboos and stigmas that surround the problem. From being described as crazy to even possessed, there is a lot that people grappling with mental health issues have to deal with. In a recent survey conducted by The Love Laugh Live Foundation, 40% respondents said that they would describe someone suffering from mental illness as 'crazy/stupid/mad'. In another survey - 60% respondents said that people with mental health problems should have their own groups and normal people should not be 'contaminated' by them.

It is this stigma that makes it difficult for those undergoing the problem to come out of the closet. In fact, due to this stigma, lack of awareness and limited access to professional help, only 10-12% of mental health patients actually seek help.

The solution

A problem as critical as mental health calls for equally critical measures. But even the most stringent of reforms must begin with the basic step - sensitisation. The role of sensitisation in eradicating any social issue simply cannot be overlooked, especially in the case of a problem like mental health where changing the mindset of people will be more than half the battle won. This is exactly what Amity Institute of Psychology and Allied Sciences (AUUP, Noida) did. Under the leadership of Prof Ranjana Bhatia, Acting Director AIPS and in partnership with KISSA Dramatics Society, they came on the streets to ignite a conversation. Taking the time tested route of nukkad naatak, they set out on their journey of sensitising the audience towards mental health with a team of 24 students of the dramatics society conceptualised SALAH - a street play that highlighted the significance of mental health. In 10 days from Oct 1 to 10, 2018 they effectively engaged over 2250 people in 7 villages of Noida and

The approach

Greater Noida.

A subject so sensitive must be handled with equal sensitivity, which is why the street play was crafted keeping in mind the target audience, their awareness, literacy levels and the social setup they belonged to. The street play comprised a series of stories, each with a message. The first situation where there is a teenage boy who is forced to do agricultural work for living by his father, so out of frustration he starts substance abuse and eventually dies because of heavy dose. The second act narrates the story of a girl who is married off to someone elder and wants to revolt, but cannot. Finally, she slips into depression. The third act presents the story of a boy who is afraid of crowds. Every time he is in a public place, he panics, shivers and sweats. Peo-

ics, culture, tradition and educa-

ple think he is being possessed and take him for exorcism which worsens his condition. Each play concludes with characters asking some hard-hitting questions and then speaking about the importance, prevention and cure of mental disorders.

The impact

So did the street play have any impact? To gauge the same, volunteers set out to interact with the villagers. The response was enlightening. Each village had a different tale to tell that was directly related to the demograph-

tion level of that particular village. "More than 90% people in villages had no idea about what mental health is and why it should be cared about as much as physical health," shares Nishul Gupta, member of KISSA Dramatics Society and student of IMA 8, AIPS. "In fact it was only after seeing the play that the villagers found out that what they presume normal is actually not normal," he added.

In village Acheja, where 85% of the menfolk are afflicted with substance abuse and where most womenfolk presumed this to be normal as they had grown up seeing this for generations, the play was an eye opener. SALAH was a revelation that addiction and substance abuse could be symptoms of a mental disorder and can be cured if timely actions are taken.

For the girls of village Salarpur, SALAH served as a new platform to share their hidden fears and mental stress of marriage, violence, low self-esteem, abuse, etc. All this while they had never known that insomnia, anxiety, headaches etc., were actually symptoms of major mental illnesses that could be healed easily with the help of professionals. Apart from the many villages, volunteers also chose to perform at Rajkiya Degree College, Noida where many incidents of bullying have been reported in the past. SALAH paved the way for self-realisation and selfchange as many students actually came out in open to speak about

We have come with the idea of installing 'Happiness Cells' in every village that will be run by qualified psychologists and counselors to help villagers sort out their mental health issues," shares Nishul Gupta. These Happiness Cells that shall constitute the second phase of the campaign also provide internship opportunities to MA (Psychology) students thus paving way further for their career in this field.

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
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La fête nationale

The corridors of the Bastille fortress, which served as the prison for liberal radicals, has been echoing with the screams of the army generals all day long. 





Learn, Play, Fun And Win With Numbers On Fingertips

he 9th edition of Inter Amity Mental Math Quiz for Class I-X was held from Dec 17-19, 2018, hosted by all eight branches of Amity Group of Schools across Delhi and NCR. The quiz, an inforamtive and learning initiative of Dr (Mrs) Amita Chauhan, Chairperson, Amity Group of Schools, was envisaged in the year 2010 to make mathematics fun and simple for the young minds and nurture young mathematicians.
