NASA's Artemis I takes off

As part of NASA's crewless Artemis I mission, the new 322-ft-tall moon rocket took off from Kennedy Space Center for a 25-day flight on November 16. Having launched exactly 50 years after Apollo programme, the rocket ship will be



orbiting the moon, aiming to come within about 80 miles of its surface, and come back to test the Orion module. If successful, the mission will help in further exploration of the moon and Mars.

UK

Launch of YPS

With an aim to strengthen links between United Kingdom and India, Prime Minister Rishi Sunak, along with



Indian PM Narendra Modi, gave a go ahead to the Young Professionals Scheme on November 16, 2022. Under the scheme, UK will annually offer 3000 places to 18-30 years old Indian degree holders to live and work in the nation for up to two years. With its implementation in early 2023, India will become the first visa-national country ever to have benefited from such a scheme.



SOUTH KOREA

BTS shines at Grammys

The boy band BTS has bagged three nominations at Grammys 2023, becoming the only Korean act to have been nominated five times. The septet is nominated for Best Pop Duo/Group Performance for the third year in a row. They are also nominated as featured artists for Album of the Year award for Coldplay's 'Music of the Spheres', and for Best Music Video for their Korean track 'Yet To Come', making it the first ever song in Korean language to have been nominated at the Grammys.



GERMANY

Floating terminal for LNG

The nation has unfurled their first floating terminal for Liquefied Natural Gas in North Sea as a fallback to the pipeline fuel supply cut exercised by Russia. A first-ofits-kind, the terminal includes a storage and regasification unit that will allow ships to deliver gas in liquid form. Working on building its energy reserves for a long time now, the country's gas storage facilities have also reportedly reached 100% capacity prior to the expected time.



KENYA

Nairobi to import trees

In a bid to make Nairobi a green city, governor Sakaja plans to import grown trees from Malaysia and plant them in the county. He also plans on launching a tree planting programme for the unemployed, granting them 20 USD per week. However, the decision has met severe criticism online with many questioning the need to do so in the first place when Kenya can plant its own trees any time.



AFGHANISTAN

Women banned from gyms

The Taliban regime has now banned women from visiting gyms, public baths and parks, after having already curtailed their right to education and employment. The blow, as per a spokesman from the Ministry of Virtue and Vice, came after the citizens failed to obey gender segregation rules put in place by the administration. The appointed teams will soon be conducting regular monitoring sessions to see if women are still using these establishments.



INDIA

India gets G20 presidency

India gained the presidency of the next G20 summit at the 17th intergovernmental meeting held in Bali, Indonesia, from November 15-16, 2022. The nation is all set to officially presume the chair from December 1, 2022, with the theme 'One Earth, One Family, One Future'. Citing data for development as the focal point of the same, PM Narendra Modi iterated that India's presidency will be all inclusive, ambitious, decisive and action-oriented.

Science meets life

Dr Sanjiban Banerjee On His Vision To Eliminate Drug Resistance

eet Dr Sanjiban Banerjee, a molecular biologist, and the co-founder of AbGenics Life Sciences Pvt Ltd., a Pune based biotech company that develops novel therapies for cancers and infectious diseases. Dr Sanjiban is also involved with holistic causes like using modern research methodologies to understand the connection between spirituality and science. His projects have been funded by Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation; and have won multiple awards. As a jury member at Youth Power 2021-22, he interacts with GT reporters and shares his passion for science, his vision to eliminate drug resistance, and more.

On the subject

Molecular biology is a specialised area of study where you learn to make new things. The subject does not offer regular jobs but teaches you to identify the problems faced by mankind and then solve them with an entrepreneurial spirit. Fortunately, I never felt any

pressure from my parents, or peers to choose a more traditional stream, so this gave me an opportunity to freely pursue molecular biology and develop my own concepts. In fact, my family and friends were curious about the subject because back then, nobody had heard about molecular biology.

On the genesis of AbGenics

I was working in the United States when I decided to come back to India and start an organisation dedicated to controlling infections. AbGenics was founded in 2010 and since then we have focused a lot on the problem of antibiotic resistance. There are many people on whom drugs don't work at all, so we need to build a drug that bacteria are not resistant to. We are developing a new class of molecules based on antibodies that will eliminate this problem and, if successful, it can bring about a huge change in the world.

On Indian medical research

Things are getting better by the day. When I made up my mind to solve the problem of drug resistance, I not only built a laboratory, but also bought the required instruments, and got all the regulatory approvals, etc. However, if I talk about my professors and guides, they did not get these facilities or resources and had to conduct their research in foreign land.

mation as now research work in India is no more dependent on countries like USA, Russia, UK, in fact, one can find many research options these days along with the resources.

On the impact of science

Molecular biology has taught me to be curious and understand how things work fundamentally. For example, when I see a pink flower which smells nice, I know about the genes responsible for its colour, or how its fragrance is affecting my senses. So, I can truly experience the flower. Also, I can handle tough situations because I can identify the problem fundamentally and solve it accordingly. Research has taught me a lot of humility as well because many a times experiments fail, and one needs to be detached about what one is doing. As written in the Bhagavad Gita, "One must do his task and not worry about the expected outcome."

On his message for Amitians

Apart from doing hard work and making a career for yourself, you need to be compassionate, be a good person and love others. Combining all of this, you will live an exciting life and shape it accordingly.

mity University Uttar Pradesh participated in the 7th edition of India Water Week*, held from November 1-5, 2022, at India Expo Centre, Greater Noida. The event was inaugurated by the President, Droupadi Murmu, in the gracious presence of the chief minister of Uttar Pradesh, Yogi Adityanath and minister of Jal Shakti, Gajendra Singh Shekhawat. Being the only university showcasing water technologies as part of India Water Week, the event holds a great significance for Amity in view of the national mission on water resources conservation and management.

Several faculty members and students participated in the India Water Week where several talks, seminars and technical sessions were held. On the first day, Prof Tanu Jindal, group additional pro vice chancellor (R&D) and director, delivered a talk on the topic

'Fresh Water Resources, Quality Issues and their Management'. Apart from this, several projects under seven technologies, namely pocket friendly water purifier, electricity from wastewater and self-cleaning of water, water meter for detection of chromium in water, lysimeter for leaching studies, water testing kit, etc., were also showcased during the exhibition.

This highly informative event concluded with three technical sessions on managing water related disasters, establishing a col-



laborative water governance regime and water for environmental livelihood. Students were also given an insight about water conservation through four panel discussions on challenges in urban water planning and management, converging towards National Perspective - IBWT, agriculture sustainability under unforeseen circumstances and the role of hydropower for energy security. Other absorbing topics that witnessed a great response from participants and audience alike were technology and innovation in water management and India-EU partnership. In addition, several other events were hosted by the Ministry of Jal Shakti, National Hydrology Project (NHP) etc. The valedictory session was chaired by the Vice President of India, Jagdeep Dhankar. Name of village: Walraversijde Located in: Ostend, Belgium Population: About 500-600 people during the medieval time

About the village

- Walraversijde is an abandoned medieval fishing village situated on the Belgian coast.
- In 1394, a flood drowned the town of Ostend and caused heavy sand drifts around the village. As a result, Walraversijde ended up in front of the dunes and thus needed to be rebuilt further inland.
- It was rediscovered in 1992 in a dune area, near a medieval dyke.
- The fishing village has been studied and analysed more thoroughly and more systematically than any other medieval fishing community in Europe.

The village has been partially reconstructed, and has a museum dedicated to the site.

About the fish population

The village lies along the shores of the North Sea, which has fishes such as sturgeon, shard, skates, salmon.

Life of fishermen in the village

- Written sources indicate that the villagers fished and traded salted fishes and other goods, and sometimes engaged in piracy. Between 1383 and 1413, privateering and piracy took place between English and Flemish fishing and trading vessels.
- The fishermen of Walraversijde participated in this privateering to the degree that they were warned not to plunder or damage ships at sea unless ordered to do so by the Duke.
- Walraversijde fishermen supplied the



Duke's fleet with vessels and the fishing fleet with guard boats throughout the fifteenth century.

The villagers also dealt in exotic spices and fruits like paradise grains, pomegranates, candlesticks and luxury ceramics.

The hardships faced

The main hardship faced by the villagers is climate change, because of which fishes

The efforts made

The Province of West Flanders opened an interactive museum, which was further named as the Walraversijde Museum in 2000 including three medieval houses and a bakery or smokehouse.

These late medieval buildings have been reconstructed with furniture, fittings and fixtures.

Flemish artists were particularly productive during the 15th century, and their paintings have served as helpful guides during reconstruction.

The museum displays artifacts which gives a sense of the medieval fishing industry and trade, as well as the risks the fishermen faced at sea, such as piracy, war and shipwrecks.

All About The Great Legacy Of Picasso


The artist: One of the most celebrated artists in the world, Pablo Ruiz Picasso (October 25, 1881 - April 8, 1973) was a Spanish painter, sculptor, printmaker, ceramicist, and theatre designer who is best known

for co-founding the cubist movement. Cubism depicts bold shapes and sharp angles, and the Spanish artist's trademark style captured everything from the horrors of the war to the boundless possibilities of the human form in it. His most famous work, titled Guernica, depicts the aerial bombing on the Basque town of Guernica in April 1937 during the Spanish Civil War. Another work of Picasso, Old Guitarist, is one of the most sorrowful paintings to ever capture the art world's imagination. The oil-on-

panel painting is from Picasso's 'blue period' which saw him restrict himself to shades of blue as he explored themes of poverty and suffering.

The legacy: Picasso created more than 20,000 paintings, drawings, sculptures, ceramics, and other items such as costumes and theater sets. Even till his nineties, Picasso continued to produce art prolifically, and when he died in 1973, he left behind an artistic legacy that continues to resonate even to date, throughout the world.

The painting: I took inspiration from the cubist por-


Unified India

While ensemble factors were at play in driving content, advent of social media played the lead. In the early 2000s, the idea of social media was very new. YouTube, founded in 2005, was just a video sharing app and Instagram was just a photo sharing app. But over the years, these apps developed into business-like spaces and hence, the content changed, too. Now, almost every product video on the internet is sponsored and creators are paid good money to promote the same.

However, it is the influx of digital devices that served as the blitzkrieg moment for the evolution of content. In less than a decade, smartphone users have skyrocketed from 62.6 M in 2010 to 265.9 M in 2019 (Statistica). The result - an increase in consumption of digital content. A 2018 survey by Adobe found that people spent more than a quarter of their day consuming digital content. When you are consuming so much, the taste and preferences are bound to be evolved. Many would rather watch videos than read text, for example. As per Marketing Sherpa, a publishing company, videos indeed attract 300% more traffic.

Today, internet and its content as such stand at the cusp of their 'big bang' moment. While the creations of this explosion remain to be seen, it would be safe to conclude -'change is the only content'.



On the receiving end, Bane's scientific team noticed a disruption in the air traffic above the stage used for the apple's reception. Everyone examined the apple, and no-



Methodology

- Take 10 ice cream sticks and arrange them side by side. Glue the edges along the length to form a base.

- Repeat steps four and five till you reach a desired height for the bird feeder (refer to the image).
- ◆Cut out two string pieces of equal length and tie one on each of the two topmost vertical sticks.
- •Now tie the open ends of the two strings together; this will be used to hang the bird feeder in your balcony, garden or on the window.
- Fill the bird feeder with some bird feed of your choice.
- ◆ Your bird feeder is now ready to feed the birds!
