This new-world customer preference has penetrated the most perfunctory aspects of their lives, where they prefer renting everything, from big assets to everyday commodities. Rally for presidential challenger

Education reforms 2020

Cultivating a career

In The Field Of Agriculture Which No Longer Is The Same As It's Stereotyped To Be

o put up with this fast paced, increasingly technological world, a career in agriculture may sound outlandish at first to some. But, in a country where agriculture is of prime importance and is undergoing every ounce of technological advancement, a career in the same can never be a bad idea. Stepping into this wide realm of agricultural studies can help one to gain a deeper understanding of agriculture, which is a lot more than just farming. Here, take a look.

What is agriculture?

In the most basic sense, agriculture is defined as the art or science of farming, including cultivation of plants and rearing of livestock to maintain and enhance human life. Agricultural science is a multi disciplinary field that comprises natural, economic and social sciences used in the practice of agriculture. India, being an agrarian economy, relies heavily on its agricultural sector and ranks second in farm outputs globally, with almost 70% of its rural households primarily dependent on it for their livelihood and employment.

Isn't agriculture and farming the same?

Agriculture is not just limited to the traditional notions of farming and cultivation, but is also the preparation and marketing of the resulting products - from the development, design and production to the very sale of everything that farmers use and produce, be it tractors, fertilisers, crops and more. Being a science, it encompasses all that comes in the



process of farming and all that is significantly different from it including horticulture, agricultural engineering, dairy technology, agricultural biotechnology, fisheries science and agronomy.

How do I enter the field?

The first step towards this arena of study is to have physics, chemistry, mathematics and biology as core subjects in 12th. To further get into agricultural science, one can pursue degree, diploma and certificate agriculture courses at UG, PG and PhD levels in its various branches including crop production, agronomy, forestry, seed technology, plant physiology etc. Many prominent universities in India like Amity University Noida and BHU Varanasi, etc. offer agricultural science as a course and conduct their own entrance examinations for admission into their B.Sc. (4 years long) and M.Sc. (2 years) programmes.

Scope and opportunities

As a science, agriculture has grown in leaps and bounds in terms of research and technology. With government schemes like Pradhan Mantri Fasal Bima Yojana, with its aim to blend in AI with agriculture, the field is becoming smarter, more efficient and high-tech with each passing day, even employing trading portals like E-NAM, various data analytics, tools, drones etc. A farmer who has his own land and has got a good yield can earn up to 10 lakh INR per annum. Moreover, studying agricultural science can help you land a job in both public and private sectors. As an agricultural engineer, you can work in the agricultural machinery division, working for R&D department or in maintenance. B.Sc. agriculture graduates can enter into job positions such as Research Officer, Quality Assurance Officer, Productions Manager, Farm Manager etc. with state agricultural departments and much more.

The field of agriculture thus is no longer the same. Through the years, it has morphed into a crucial science, augmenting human life every bit. With more and more diverse courses in this field of study awaiting you now, it seems, as the best time to explore this sphere more.

Here's Looking At Some Endangered Species Who Made A Comeback With A Bang

That we humans have made of this planet is something everyone is now aware of. There is no hidden truth about the fact that we have destroyed the environment and caused our fellow beings a lot of trouble, directly and indirectly, only to realize later that the world cannot survive without the ecological balance that they provide. However, some of these strong beasts have bounced back from the dead and are taking the torch of life forward, with their consistently growing numbers! Here's looking at some of them and celebrating them all!

See ya 'not so' later, alligator

Science & Technology

The alligator was one of those poor animals which the humans decided to carry around with themselves, quite literally! Extremely popular for their skin used as a material for shoes, jackets and bags, the alligator was added to the Endangered Species Preservation Act in the US during the late 1960s. Such was their loss mourned that it was in two decades, that they were put back on the fully recovered list, in 1987.

Golden 'Age' Monkey Native to Brazil, the monkeys lost 93% of their rainforest and their family after the forests were cleared for development. The numbers dwindled so much as to stoop to a mere 200 monkeys only. But with the help of many conservationists and government schemes, the candle of hope for their conservation began to burn brighter and their numbers increased to 1000!

'Grizzling' in and out of extinction!

The grizzly bear, a popular bear in the wild, was first put on the endangered list in 1975 as America realized that there were only 140 left. Eventually, their numbers grew and now there are around 1200 only in the Yellowstone area, and about 50,000 around the world. So when they lost their endangered classification in 2017, activists began to worry that the loss of protection might put the species at risk again. But for now, the bears are bearing a brave fight!

The 'dark' horse

Horses roaming around in the wild may seem like a common sight, but these species of wild horses have lost themselves somewhere in the trend. Domes-

tication of horses on such a large scale had led to the near extinction of Przewalski's horse species in the 1960s. It was at that time that the nine remaining horses in the zoos were left open in their old habitat in Mongolia, China and Ukraine. Today, the number has increased to 400, but they're still considered to be an endangered species.

'Tiger' zinda hai

In terms of endangered animals, India was also not far behind, with our very own national animal living on the brink of extinction. Luckily, with the efforts of wildlife authorities and campaigns, their numbers have seen a steady growth over the years, with 1411 in 2006 to 2226 in 2014, and 2967 tigers in 2018, the roar in the forest has not died out just yet!

We humans must realize that life in the wild is as essential to the planet as the life inside our homes. Let us take inspiration from these species that returned from the brink of extinction and save other species from becoming the next dinosaurs!

The universe is filled with wonders. There are some creations, that fill us with amazement - some with the way they look, some with the way in which they carry out certain processes, in this case reproduction.

Clown fish

Scientific name: Amphiprioninae



The clown fish are Hermaphrodites, which in layman's terms means that these fish are born males and with age, they turn into a female. The reproductive cycle of an anemone fish is often similar and is correlated to the lunar cycle, i.e the spawning of the fish peaks around the first and the third quarters of the moon and the egg hatches around the full moon or the new moon period. Well, that is quite moon-ish.

Seahorse

Scientific name: Hippocampus

Seahorses are amazingly inverse creatures. With them, the responsibility of procreation is borne by the male members. The male seahorse is equipped with a pouch. When mating, the female seahorse deposits up to 1,500 eggs in the male's pouch, initiating a 3 week pregnancy that is marked by the male seahorse's inability to move around and search for food. After 3 days of labour, it finally gives birth.

Black widow spider

Scientific name: Latrodectus

Mating is a pretty deadly job with this species. The female spider mostly devours on the male after the mating period is over, thus the name 'widow'. When a male is mature, he spins a sperm web, deposits semen on it and invites the female, they reproduce sexually and the female deposits her eggs in a globular silken container in which they remain camouflaged and guarded. In rare cases, the female catches the male while trying to escape but often the male seems to welcome his fate by actively summersaulting on his partner's fangs.

Male leafy sea dragon

Scientific name: Phycodurus eques

The female produces about 250 bright pink eggs and deposits them onto the male's tail with her ovipositor which is a long tube. After getting attached to their father's brood pouch, the eggs spend a quality time of about nine weeks with their father and in this course, change their colour to purple or orange. When ready to see the world, the male sea dragon shoots the baby sea dragon out of its tail during a long 24-48 hours process. Only 5% of the total eggs survive by the end and they are quite independent by birth.


The splashing of the cold water jerked me out of my sleep, and surprisingly, the guy was still there.

Prem Ganpath Founder Of Dosa Plaza

Born in a poor family in Nagalapuram, Tamil Nadu, with unemployed parents and seven siblings to look after, Prem Ganpathy became the sole bread earner for his family at a very young age. As a Class X pass out with unfulfilled dreams to study more, he left his home for Chennai in search of a stable source of income, but to his utter dismay, he could only earn a meagre INR 250 per month. Yet his zeal and determination to make something out of himself didn't let him quit, but then his fate wasn't really yielding either. On being promised a salaried job of INR 1,200 per month in Mumbai, he took off for the city of dreams at the tender age of 17, only to be duped and robbed later. Stranded there partly because of a lack of money to go back and also due to the language gap, he still didn't give up. Shuffling through a number of odd jobs, like washing dishes in a local bakery, for INR 150 per month, he finally managed to save enough to begin his new

venture of selling idlis and dosas by 1992. **To Riches**

With a capital of INR 1000, he rented a handcart and a few utensils to begin his business opposite Vashi railway station, Mumbai. The authenticity of his recipes and the importance he gave to hygiene soon attracted a lot of customers, generating for him a profit of about INR 20,000 per month. His young customer-base taught him how to use internet, giving him access to try out recipes from across the world, adding a wide range of variety, about 104 fusion mixes to a simple dish of dosa. And then his lady luck never let him down. From a handcart in 1992 to a shop in 1997, to an outlet in Centre One mall, Vashi in 2003 and finally to 70 Dosa Plaza outlets not only in India but in New Zealand, Dubai and Oman, his INR 1,000 venture had become a 30-crore empire, a sole runner in south Indian cuisines with a nationwide popularity for its innovation and variety of recipes. His story is truly a testament of how life's hardships and betrayals are nothing but a speck in front of firm determination and will.

Ramesh Babu Owner Of Ramesh Tours IDRA And Travels

Ramesh Babu, from Bangalore is a shining example of someone who has surged ahead in this cut throat world all on the dint of his determination, risk-taking ability and insight, while still sticking to his roots. Having lost his father in 1979, at the age of 7, Ramesh's life has always been a struggle to survive against conflict and poverty. His mother worked as a maid-servant to provide for her children and their education, while renting out their father's only legacy, a barber shop to their uncle at just INR 5 per day. Struggling for even basic essentials like food and clothing, Ramesh however managed to complete his pre-university education by taking up several small jobs and working as a newspaper vendor alongside, till the very day he finally took over their paternal barber shop from his bickering uncle to run it himself, naming it Inner Space later on.

While flourishing as a barber, he always dreamt of owning a car and so ended up buying a used Maruti van in 1994, initially intended for personal use. This car however came with a mortgage on

the family house and so in order to meet all the EMIs with an interest amount of about 6800 INR, he started renting out the car to raise the amount, which acted as a huge turning point in his life. Thus, what began as a passionate need, soon converted into a gigantically successful car rental business by 2004. His very first customer was Intel. Slowly and steadily he began to build a fleet of luxury cars as no one in the 90's dealt with luxury car renting. Criticisms from all the corners didn't stop him from taking such risks. Thus, from a Maruti van, Ramesh moved on to have a fleet of 200 cars including the likes of Mercedes, BMW and Rolls Royce. Several big shots like Shah Rukh Khan, Amitabh Bachchan and a number of politicians have used his rental services. He has also been featured in several news channels and newspapers all over the country, but come mornings and over the weekends, one can still find him giving haircuts at his salon for INR 100, which he says is his true vocation and his way to always remember his humble beginnings. Winfrey was born to an unmarried teenage mother, Vernita Lee, in 1954, Mississippi, US. The identity of her father was an issue of debate back then, but Vernon Winfrey, a miner, has been noted as her biological father. Both her parents separated soon after she was born and she was left in the care of her maternal grandmother on a farm thus living in rural poverty for the first 6 years of her life. Her grandmother was so poor that sometimes Winfrey had to wear dresses made of potato sacks and was also severely beaten if she failed to do any chores. But she taught Oprah to read and write at just the age of 2, for which she is forever grateful. At the age of 6, she was returned to her mother's care in the Milwaukee ghetto, a very poor northern neighbourhood. Her mother was a maid and never really cared about her. This lifestyle subjected Winfrey to repeated sexual molestation by her cousin and uncle, leaving her pregnant

by the age of 14. The baby however died due to being born premature. Not only this, her poverty was rubbed in her face daily as she resorted to stealing money from her mother. Post it, she was left in a shelter for difficult teenagers, from where she was rescued by her father. He took her to Nashville to stay with him and was very encouraging. He prioritised her education above all.

To Riches

With her father's emphasis on education and oratory skills, she not only participated in her school's drama and debate club but also secured scholarship in Tennessee State University where she studied communication. Her first job was at a local grocery store, but later she attracted the attention of various media houses, becoming Nashville's first Afro-American female co-anchor of the evening news at CBS in 1974. And then there was no stopping. She worked for several talk shows like Baltimore

is Talking, AM Chicago (which was later renamed as The Oprah Winfrey show) etc. Apart from a phenomenal talk-show host career, she excelled in acting too. She acted in Steven Spielberg's 'The Color Purple' based on Alice Walker's book with the same name, for which she was nominated for the Academy awards as the best supporting actress. Later on, she formed her own production company Harpo, where she produced stories that she wanted should reach out to people. Although one of the wealthiest self-made woman in America and the highest paid entertainer in the world, Winfrey has always been involved in various philanthropic missions, one of them being her 1994 proposal bill to Congress, aimed at creating a single database to help track child abusers. The bill was signed into law by President Clinton. Surely, she has won several accolades in her life but the number of hearts she has won is beyond human comprehension.

Material required

ScissorsHot glue gun

- Paper cutter-1
- Paint brush-1
- Colourful sheets-4
- Wooden sticks-3
 Black acrylic paint-1
 A3 size pastel sheets-3
 Appy Fizz bottles-2 (one
- small, one big)

Method

- Take a large empty Appy Fizz bottle, and using a paper cutter, cut it from the top and bottom in a way to secure its middle neck portion.
- Now take a small Appy Fizz bottle, and invert this neck part over it, inserting its narrow end into the bottle's mouth.
- Stick both these pieces together using hot glue.
- Paint this whole pot-like structure with black acrylic paint or any other colour of your choice.
- Now, using old colourful sheets, cut out some paper confetti.
- Sprinkle it over the pot randomly, while the paint is still wet.
- Take a thin strip of paper, preferably 1cm, and paste it over and around the pot, exactly where it is the widest.
- Keep the pot aside and let it dry.
- For the flowers, take an A3 sheet and cut out 16 equal squares from it.
- Now, stack up these squares, one over the other, and cut this stack from its edges, to give it a wavy heart shape on the top and a flat base.
- You will get 16 wavy heart shaped paper pieces that will act as petals for the flowers.
- Curl the heart shaped edge of about 12 petals by using force and scissors.
- Take a thin wooden stick and on its top end, wrap and paste 4 uncurled petals loosely, by applying glue on their side edges.



Educators Discuss Gender Issues And Learning Virtually

workshop on 'Gender Sensitivity', an important issue of the 21st century was held through webinar for the educators of Amity on July 11, 2020. The programme organized under the aegis of HR and Training department was an initiative of the visionary guidance of Dr (Mrs) Amita Chauhan, Chairperson, Amity Group of Schools and RBEF, who believes that gender-sensitive educators make learning more immersive and unbiased because of their indepth understanding of genderbased requirements. The

objective of the webinar was to develop gender sensibilities in educators to help them innovate pedagogies for better classroom engagement with equal participation of genders. The virtual workshop was conducted by Arti Chopra, Principal, AIS Gurugram 46 and was attended by 985 educators, from different branches of Amity Group of Schools all over India.

The session commenced with chanting of Gayatri Mantra along with a virtual lamp lighting ceremony. Chairperson in her address shared the need for nurturing happy children without any bias at school and home. Resource person Arti Chopra ex-

plained that the classroom dynamics play a crucial role in defining how well girls and boys participate in classroom proceedings that affect their performance. Educators are pivotal to these processes, thus their attitude and responsiveness towards gender sensitivity is integral to the active involvement of both girls and boys in the pedagogical processes. She advocated that gender sensitization is about changing behaviour and changing the mindset of people towards gender-specific tasks. Instilling empathy into the hearts of the students about the other gender is crucial for a free, democratic and secular society. She threw light upon the society's recognition of gender stereotypes and the prevalent patriarchy in many parts of the country that has lead to creating biases in the minds of people. She also elaborated upon the essential qualities that a gendersensitive school should have and explained gender-sensitive pedagogy and teaching-learning materials with the help of examples, videos, interactive slides, questionnaires and activities. The session indeed empowered the educators with skills to identify issues that could create barriers in the minds of children, which would further help them ensure synergized classrooms. GI
