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The art of hoarding

In This Game Of Material Possessions, Choose All Your Adventures Wisely!

Me: *trying to clean my closet* My hoarder brain: *whispering* Hey! What if we need that (20 years) later...? In a world consumed by a consumer-driven economy, many of us are enticed into making purchases we may not even require. Many, however, often fail to recognise when this innocuous habit turns into the harmful disorder called hoarding. According to the American Psychological Association's reports, approximately 2 to 6% of the world population exhibits compulsive hoarding tendencies, with this percentage escalating among the elderly. The consequences extend beyond mere physical clutter, casting a shadow over personal relationships as well. What then distinguishes a benign collection from the gripping grasp of hoarding?

Understanding the problem

People often attach sentimental value to things as these are associated with memories, feelings, and our sense of identity. To some, it may bring comfort to be around familiar things. This makes it hard to let go, even when material possessions no longer serve a purpose. Research shows that people with hoarding tendencies tend to feel heightened anxiety and distress when faced with the prospect of discarding things. The condition was first researched in the 1950s, as Collyer's Syndrome, and in the 1990s, it was called OCD (Obsessive-Compulsive Disorder). It was then classified as Hoarding Disorder (HD) in

2013. According to a 1993 study by Frost and Gross, "Hoarders tend to buy extra things in order not to be caught without a needed item, and they carried more 'justin-case' items in purses, pockets, and cars."

Identifying the clutter

Hoarding can manifest itself in many different forms. According to the Clutter-Hoarding Scale developed by the National Study Group on Compulsive Disorganisation, there are, as they say, five stages of hoarding. Level 1 hoarders are difficult to spot because there isn't much clutter and the house is still habitable. Those at Level 2 exhibit problems like overflowing stacks of objects, and accumulation of animal waste and garbage. Hoarders at Level 3 are identifiable by distinct, unpleasant odours and unsanitary living conditions. At Level 4, hoarding reaches a dangerously high degree where the odour increases excessively along with storage of objects, animal excrement, etc. The access and exit to the house are blocked off. At the highest stage of Level 5, the hoarder may be subject to legal actions such as

Impact on surroundings

The impact of hoarding also affects the surroundings and relationships. American studies show that hoarding typically starts between the ages of 15 and 19. In such

homes, less than 30% of the available space is usable due to the clutter, and this poses an increased risk of familial conflict. According to a report, such conflicts lead to a diminished quality of life for all involved. It can also contribute to a rise in injuries resulting from falls, damage to properties, etc. Clutter

can also be a fire safety hazard. According to the NFPA, "hoarding impacts

the entry and exit from a place under fire because it is hard to enter the place and provide the necessary rescue and medicare to victims."

Road to recovery

A person's capacity to live an everyday normal life in a secure and healthy way distinguishes the hoarding disorder from simple clutter. Acceptance is crucial, whether you are experiencing symptoms yourself or someone you know is. Understanding the illness and in-

dividuals who suffer from it is paramount. Professionals presently use therapies, such as CBT (Cognitive Behavioural Therapy) and medication to assist patients. Whether you devise a plan of action on your own or call for professional help, the path is not easy, but at the same time, it is not impassable. With a correct, comprehensive approach and professional help, one can surely overcome the hurdle of hoarding.



ARMENIA

30,000 refugees arrive

According to the Armenian government, almost 30,000 refugees (out of around 120,000 ethnic Armenians)

from the Nagorno-Karabakh region in Azerbaijan have fled their country to enter Armenia. The mass exodus comes after Azerbaijan's seizure of Nagorno-Karabakh area and saw hundreds of cars and buses, filled with thousands of people, fleeing to reach the Armenian town of Goris across the border, with Azerbaijani border security subjecting the fleeing refugees to rigorous checks.






Rare military parade

In a bid to showcase their tough stance against North Korea, South Korea presented its first large-scale military parade in a decade. With weapons ranging from ballistic missiles to giant tanks, the parade marked the nation's Armed Forces Day, usually a muted event in the country. President Yoon Suk Yeol, at the event, warned Pyongyang against the use of nuclear weapons and pledged to ramp up support for the military as well as the defence industry of the country. People lined the streets of the capital Seoul to cheer as troops, tanks, missiles, and an underwater drone was put on display.



protest, the Writers Guild of America, in an unanimous decision by the WGA West board and the WGA East council, has

voted to lift the strike. The authorities approved a rise in the pay of the writers as well as intellectual protection around the use of AI in their field. The next step is said to discuss the new agreements, and the members of WGA will cast their votes for the new contracts by October 9.







NIGERIA

Indefinite strike

The National Labour Congress and the Trade Union Congress, have announced to start an indefinite strike to protest against the rising cost of living crisis in the country. According to the union leaders, the decision comes as an aftermath of govt. scrapping the decades-old petrol subsidy. The unions have been pushing the President to reverse the scrapping of the subsidy, but the govt. stuck to their decision as the subsidy 'was draining govt finances'.





Five million birds killed

More than five million invasive quelea birds have been killed in a massive cull in the country, citing the birds having invaded more than 1000 acres of rice farmland in the Manyara region, as the reason. According to The Tanzania Times, the invasion was capable of destroying more than 50 tonnes of food crops every day, so the Tanzania Plant Health and Pesticides Authority spent more than four days in spraying the swarms of birds with avicides.





INDIA

First individual gold

Indian shooter Sift Kaur Samra created history as she won gold in the women's 50m rifle 3 position event on day four at the Asian Games in Hangzhou. Sift's total score was 469.6, 2.6 points more than previous highest world record held by Seonaid McIntosh. Her win marks India's first individual gold at the event as well as the fifth overall gold win. Ashi Chouksey, also representing India, bagged bronze in the same event, taking India's overall tally to 18 medals.





NEPAL

12 agreements with China

After a meeting between Chinese Premier Li Qiang and PM of Nepal Pushpa Kamal Dahal, 12 agreements have been signed between the two nations, including seven MoUs to 'enhance bilateral cooperation in sectors including trade, road connectivity, and IT'. According to a press release issued by the Nepal embassy in Beijing, the two leaders discussed on how to further strengthen the mutual understanding to improve both economies.

Spark of the idea

It comes from the kind of person I am and my life experiences. I came first in the All-India Merit exam conducted by the Indian Army, but I decided not to pursue that. Instead, I went on to work as an intern with Ladakh Environment Help Organisation for two weeks. Working with them helped me realise that I love engaging with people at the grassroot level. For me, India is the most culturally diverse nation, which is why I wanted to work with the local communities to build an authentic platform where they can showcase the beauty of their land whilst sustaining its environment.

Man-environment conflict

It's a very fine balance that we need to strike, and it is also a very important factor for local stakeholders to understand. An example of this would be how Bhutan uses tourism; they follow high impact and low volume tourism. They have certain fees, like Sustainable Development Fees, which are levied on every tourist and are used for development. In a similar way, tourists also need to become aware of how they act as consumers. Don't just restrict yourself to a fancy hotel or taking photos for IG; travel is not meant to be like that. Rather get to know the real essence of the place you are at and see how you can give back to the community that's welcoming you.

Hub of opportunities

Offbeat Tracks aims to create various economic hubs for multiple local communities. In various villages in the mountains, a lot of men leave their hometown to work in more bustling cities, leaving the women and older generation behind to fend for farms and field. But if we aim to create employment opportunities within their villages, they won't have to struggle so much. For such scenarios, decentralisation is very important. Look at Ladakh; Leh has be-


Thumbs down

Maybe, Going Beyond Earth Is Not Their Dream!

Research and discovery often necessitate dubious procedures in order to make sense. Quite often innocent animals find themselves being pulled into a train of trials, all in the name of broadening one's horizons of knowledge. But how far can one go in this quest of knowledge? Maybe too far.

Laika was a mere stray roaming carelessly on the streets of Moscow before she became a guinea pig for the launch of Sputnik 2 by the USSR. Little did she know that her first launch would be her last. Pressed by panic, she 'expired' merely a few hours after the launch. Sure, she became a celebrity, but posthumous wins are hard to celebrate, which begs the question – should animals even be sent to space?

While Laika gained celebrity status, there were many others before her who went on this suicide mission. The first living creature to be sent to space were fruit flies aboard the V2 rocket on Feb 20, 1947. Several others being apes, tortoises, mice, fish, etc. None of them survived. While some died immediately, others had irrevocable effects on health, ultimately leading to their demise.

The analysis of the brain of mice flown in space for 13 days, found significant changes related to neuron structure and metabolic function, that could eventually result in neurodegeneration. Ham, the first chimpanzee to make it to sub-orbital space, was subjected electric shocks to the soles of his feet during his 18-month long training, following which re-

straints were placed on several parts of his body. So, even after his return, he chose to remain isolated, and passed away at the age of 26.

And yet, the animals-are-expendable attitude continues to pervade all of mankind's forays into space. And why not, for it comes "for the greater good." As NASA points out, "without animal testing in the early days of the human space program, the Soviet and American programs could have suffered great losses of human life." The range of studies that rely on animals to garner critical information for human planned space travel is immense. "Despite losses, these animals have taught scientists a tremendous amount, more than could have been learned without them," says NASA. Besides, experiments involving animals are not limited to space, but also on earth, thus broadening the scope of research.

Sure, there is no refuting the immense impact that animals have had on our knowledge of space, but does this give us humans the right to take

advantage of their lack of discretionary powers. That's a question we

advantage of their lack of discretionary powers. That's a question we need to ponder over, given that it is their right to live that we are talking about. One might argue that humans too have made sacrifices with many succumbing to fate on their space travels, but let's not forget that they always had a choice, a say in the matter. Whereas, animals were written off to martyrdom, something they did not sign up for.

Besides, if being human isn't what requires us to treat animals humanely, then what in the world does?








The Chola INVASION




In 1025 CE, the emperor of the Chola empire, Rajendra I, decided to invade Srivijaya, a maritime kingdom bustling with many ships and merchants.








So, the Chola empire's navel fleet set sail towards Southeast Asia, reaching near the Srivijaya port of Palembang, which was an important

Just as the letter reached the king, the Chola navy attacked the port, ultimately defeating the guards present and started their march towards the city





But due to insufficient preparation, the Srivijaya army was defeated and their king was captured by the Chola army


