For this automation is for several, if not all, firms in the working world an unfair chance at clamping down on employee unionisation and cutting costs. Case in point - sudden lay-offs conducted by National Eating Disorders Association in May 2023, when the US

helpline workers unionised against it. It also leads to a colossal loss of creativity. For AI, though adept at automating tasks, struggles with creative thinking. If that wasn't enough, it is also believed to cause unwanted alienation, for not only would it make the human workforce feel estranged from the decision-making processes, but it would also exacerbate economic disparities. On the flipside, AI's rise is what has made it possible for us to shift our focus on the upskilling of individuals. To attain the same, public-private initiatives, Reskilling Revolution for one, are aiming to train one billion workers by 2030. A lot of emphasis is being laid on the need to cultivate soft skills as AI cannot replicate these. So, think about it and think long and hard - what good are these jobs that the bots can replace? For these machines might understand that they need to work, but they would always need a human to tell them what to work on and how.

All emerging technologies experience the Gartner Hype Cycle. So, know that only when the reality sets in and the software's operational capacity ripens, would we be able to ascertain its true prowess. 



Longest space mission

Astronaut Frank Rubio has broken the record for the longest space

mission after spending more than 355 days in low-Earth orbit. Believed to be carrying out a six-month long mission, Rubio left for International Space Station aboard Russian Soyuz capsule on Sep 21, 2022. His initial return was pushed back after the spacecraft hit a snag. He is scheduled to return on Sep 27, 2023, a return that would make him the first American to spend more than one calendar year in microgravity.



Face veils banned

The nation's government, on Sept 12, 2023, put a ban on wearing nigab (full-face veil) within

school premises for the academic year starting from September 30. The new dress code allows students to wear a head cover that doesn't mask the face. The decision to introduce this new coordinated approach regarding dress code is aimed at striking a balance between religious expression and ensuring a unified educational environment.







JAPAN

Cabinet reshuffled

PM Kishida made major changes in the latest cabinet reshuffle, appointing former justice minister Yoko Kamikawa as foreign minister in Hayashi's stead, making her the third woman to be appointed as a top diplomat in Japan. Focusing on gender equality, the new cabinet features five women, just as it did under Koizumi in 2001 and Abe in 2014. Furthermore, to maintain stability in key positions, Kishida has also retained six cabinet officials, including finance minister Shunichi Suzuki and economy minister Yasutoshi Nishimura, among others.







FRANCE

Anti-subsidy probe into EVs

The European Commission has launched an investigation into subsidies provided to electric vehicle makers in China. With global markets being swarmed with cheap Chinese electrics, whose prices are low due to huge subsidies, EU president Ursula von der Leyen, in her annual State of the Union address, said that the market is being falsely altered and it is essential that the bloc defends itself against such practices.





LIBYA

Floods cause mayhem

The floods triggered by Mediterranean storm Daniel have wreaked havoc in the nation's eastern city of Derna, killing more than 5,300 people and displacing around 30,000 more. Due to the intense damage caused by the flood, the coastal city was inaccessible via road and aide could only reach the affected region after more than 36 hours since the disaster struck.





INDIA

Agreement with Saudi Arabia

PM Modi and SA's Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman chaired a meeting of Strategic Partnership Council, discussing issues ranging from energy efficiency, trade, energy security, healthcare, and defense. As part of the meet, the two countries signed eight agreements, including one by energy ministers, expanding the partnership to include renewable energy, green hydrogen, gas grids, petroleum, and electricity.





BANGLADESH

Bilateral ties with France

In an attempt to enhance bilateral ties, the country on Sept 11, 2023, signed a deal with France, committing to buy ten A350 aircrafts worth 3.2 billion USD from European maker Airbus. During the talks held, a letter of intent was also exchanged to provide Bangladesh with an earth observation satellite through collaborative efforts of Bangladesh Satellite Company Limited (BSCL) and Airbus Defense and Space SAS.

The great legal luminary

An Insight Into The Bona Fide Journey Of Senior Advocate Vikas Singh

nown for his cogent pitches in courtroom, Vikas Singh, Senior Advocate and President of the **Supreme** Court Bar Association & Former Additional Solicitor General of India, Supreme Court of India, is a noteworthy figure in the field of law. In addition to a remarkable legal career, Vikas Singh is a visiting faculty member of the Parliament of India, where he imparts his invaluable insights to the country's lawmakers. To acknowledge his contribution in the legal area, he was conferred with honorary doctorate degree in Convocation 2022 at AUUP. GT reporters did not miss the opportunity to delve into his vast legal acumen, and took note of some of his experiences.

From chemistry to law

I studied chemistry because my father thought that science would give me an insight into different analytical abilities, which in turn, would be beneficial for me in near future. So, I studied science and thereafter, worked in a company for nine years. At this point, I was nowhere connected to law. But soon I decided to quit and before putting in my papers, I familiarised myself with the



legal world. Gradually, I appeared for practice sessions and realised that I can do it. It was indeed a very unique start which made me closer to what I really aspired to do.

Different characters

Any lawyer who wishes to be successful must understand the pain of his client. But at the same time, one should be detached from the outcome of the case. It's almost similar to acting in a film. You get into a character, understand that character and then get out of it as soon as the filming ends. And lawyers do this on a daily basis, and sometimes there are as many as ten cases in a day. We do different characters and we come out of the characters because if we don't come out of it, it will be emotionally wrecking.

Favourite moments

I've had some really strong cases on the division and decentralisation of power. There

have been situations where I've stood up to the Chief Justice of India and expressed how a particular matter does not fall under his jurisdiction. In fact, in 2005, when I stated something similar to a bench of the Chief Justice of India, they were all shell-shocked because they hadn't experienced something like this before. Perhaps, I was the first attorney general to stand up for what is rightfully the law and express the same fearlessly in front of everyone.

Message for Amitians

I would say, "Put your heart into whatever you wish to do." For I believe, money is not the only metric of success. You should enjoy your work and try to improve the lives of others around you. And when you accomplish the same, no one can stop you from becoming successful.GT

Our Love-Hate Equation With Mathematics



The block that says - 'I don't know what to choose'.


And then there are times when you don't know what to write because you simply don't know which one to choose. Again, FOMO! You don't want to be missing out on the jackpot

Scene V: Ashoka weeps and ultimately de-


cides to embrace Buddhism Ashoka: After witnessing the agony on the battleground, my heart is shattered. I have decided to mend my ways and work for the good of humanity. I am devoting the rest of my life to ahinsa (non-violence) and dharma-vijaya (victory by dharma).

Maharani Devi: What a great decision, my king. It's not war but dharma that will make you immortal in the annals of history. I am with you and so will be our children. They will travel far and wide to spread the teachings of Buddhism.

Ashoka: My dharma now is to practice honesty, truthfulness, compassion, mercifulness, benevolence, and non-violence. I will respect all religions and give them full freedom to live according to their own principles. To attain that, I am appointing a special class of high officers called the 'dharma ministers' who will foster dharma work and relieve human suffering.

Epilogue

Kalinga remained Ashoka's first and last war. For, post that, the only glory he sought was to lead his people along the path of dharma (also known as dhamma). His dharma laws were, as such, carved into rocks and stone pillars across Magadha. He also sent missionaries from his empire to other countries to preach Buddhism so that more people could adopt a non-violent way of life. His sole focus on nonviolence, however, also became one of the factors that led to the eventual fall of the Mauryan empire after his death in 232 BC.

Though Rahul had not intended to spend his summer break like this, he couldn't help but be intrigued by the dark forest. "Perhaps it won't be so boring after all,"



Ingredients

All-purpose flour	1/2 cup
White sugar	5 tsp
Brown sugar	1/2 cup
Unsalted butter	1/4 cup
Salted butter	1/4 cup
Salt	1/2 tsp
Vanilla essence	2 tsp
Instant coffee	1/2 tsp
Baking soda	1/2 tsp
Eggs	2
Sugar free dark chocolate	2/3 cups
Ice cube	1

Procedure

- ■In a saucepan, add some unsalted butter and salted butter together and mix them well.
- ■Put the butter mix on low flame and let it boil till it becomes deep amber in colour.
- ■Now, add an ice cube to this melted brown butter mix and let it cool down a bit.
- ■In a bowl, sift flour, baking soda and salt.
- ■Once done, add some brown sugar, white sugar, vanilla essence, instant coffee, and brown butter in it and blend all the ingredients properly using a hand mixer.
- ■Now, add two eggs to this batter and whisk it all to give it a light brown colour.
- ■Then, knead the batter until it gets a dough like consistency.
- ■Add some dark chocolate chunks to it and using the folding motion, incorporate them into the dough.
- ■Cover the dough with plastic wrap and let it chill in the refrigerator for 12 hours.
- ■Next, take a baking sheet and spread some butter on it.
- ■Then, sprinkle a little bit of flour all over the baking sheet. This will prevent the dough from sticking to the sheet.
- ■Now, using a cookie scoop, scoop out balls of dough onto the baking sheet, spacing them roughly 2 inches apart.
- ■Put the cookie dough balls in the oven and bake them at 200 degrees Celsius for around 15-17 minutes.
- ■Your butter cookies are ready! Keep some aside for your guests and dig in on the rest.


■Coloured A4 sheets ■Scissors


■Tape

Method

- ■Take a colourful A4 sheet, and using a ruler, measure and cut one inch off its shorter end (alongside its width). Keep it aside to use it as the handle of your lantern later on.
- ■Vertically fold the rest of the paper in half.
- ■Now, hold the folded sheet horizontally and from its folded edge, make some incisions on it, spacing each about 1.5 cm apart. ■Make sure the incisions you
- make are one cm short of touching the open edge of the sheet.
- Once done, unfold the paper and roll it vertically to form a lantern. Secure the roll using tape or stapler.
- ■Now, staple the handle we made in step one at the top of the lantern as shown in the picture. Decorate your lantern with glitter and sequins.
- ■Your Chinese lanterns are ready to adorn your walls!

Cyberbullying - a growing threat

Panellist: Rakshit Tandon

Founder & director, Hackdev Technology Pvt Ltd.

"Having interacted with millions of kids nationwide as part of my two decades long experience in the field, I have realised that a complete erasure of cyberbullying is the need of the hour. For online sexual abuse cases are rising, with children even as young as 7-10 years old falling prey to it. Teaching



cyber-hygiene and netiquettes to this vulnerable lot, thus, should be our number one priority. If they start consuming age-appropriate content, a lot of cyberbullying can be controlled. Besides, unlike traditional bullying that was confined to a small circle, cyberbullying's reach is vast, leaving a lasting digital footprint that can haunt a child repeatedly. To prevent that from happening, our immediate attention and action is needed."

To act or not to act is the question

Panellist: Dr Kshitija Wason

Professor & head, Department of Psychology, DU

"Bystanders in bullying are inactive observers who witness instances of real-life or cyberbullying without acting, thus inadvertently contributing to the harm inflicted on victims. In contrast, upstanders display a proactive mindset by raising their voices against unfair and hurtful behaviour, thus shield-



ing people from becoming victims of any form of bullying. Empathy, as an emotional ability, is something that can help transform the former lot into the latter, and by virtue of that, help diminish the power of bullies and break the cycle of abuse. So, if you experience anything that is demeaning, bullying, or degrading in nature, please do not be a bystander. Report it!" Part III

Detect bullying in the classroom

Panellist: Maj Gen Gurpal Singh Bal (Retd)

Senior advisor & dean of students welfare Amity University, Manesar

"In order to detect bullying, educators should be vigilant and observant of the changes taking place in a student's behaviour, especially if he/she is hesitant to come forward. Frequent interactions with such students is one way of noticing this and finding any signs of



distress or unease. When educators identify a child being put down, they should focus on building their self-esteem through innovative methods that encourage respect and admiration from peers. For acknowledging and

> valuing their differences, be it mental or psychological, is crucial to create a supportive and inclusive environment where the issue of bullying can be addressed effectively."

Ensuring online safety for all

Panellist: Sunil Barsaiyan

Cyber cell incharge, Amity University

"Creating awareness about cyberbullying is crucial, but it is equally important to utilise the available provisions to address such behaviour. Social media platforms offer tools to report negative content, the only thing then required is a coordinated effort from users to actively report it. Users should also be



cautious when using hashtags and should consider the reach of their content before posting, as unknown audiences may contribute to negativity. Protecting privacy, thus, is vital. To attain the same, individuals must review their privacy settings, restrict permissions for third-party apps, and refrain from oversharing personal data online.'


