## When Ink Fades, Stories Live; A Journey Through Lost Words

The lost letters

• Chope this letter finds you well" – this tender phrase has been the opening line in myriad letters, which were once our only medium for sharing emotions and exchanging ideas. Letters of the past, in fact, will always hold a special place in our hearts, for they have shaped the course of politics, literature and most of all, personal connections. Unfortunately, many of these letters never reached their destinations and were lost in the annals of time. Let's rediscover this treasure trove by finding out about...

#### ...Letters that could have brought hope

During Taiwan's repressive 'White Terror' era, political prisoners penned their last words to their families. These letters, which were full of love, hope and final goodbyes, were intercepted by the Taiwanese government and could never reach families waiting for those last few words from their loved ones.

One prisoner had written, "It's my last night and I still feel the same happiness I felt as a child. I don't feel any loss of hope. So grandma, I wish you wouldn't feel any pain on my account." Another imprisoned man wrote to his children, "On this earth you will never see your father again. No matter whether it brings you joy or distress, you must not forget your mother and father." These unread letters will forever carry the burden of unfulfilled hopes and unanswered prayers.

#### Letters that could have changed history

Some of these lost letters could have reshaped history as we know it, if they had been delivered on time and acted upon. Mahatma Gandhi, for instance, had written to Adolf Hitler in 1939 wherein he had addressed him as a "friend". Gandhi had urged him to stop the impending war with these poignant words, "You are today the one person in the world who can prevent a war which may reduce humanity to the savage state. Is it too much to ask you for peace...which must mean much to the millions of Europeans ... " The letter, however, could never reach in time, and just a few weeks later, Germany invaded Poland in September 1939, marking the beginning of World War II. If this letter had been delivered, who knows what the trajectory of history would have been?

### ...Letters that got the chance to live again

Thankfully, due to the efforts of historians, academics and many others, a multitude of historically significant letters have been brought to life once again. For example, dozens of unpublished letters written by the celebrated playwright, William Shakespeare, were discovered in London in 1989. These remarkable letters are written in extraordinary detail, because Shakespeare apparently wanted to create a record for his two-year-old son, reveal a wealth of as-yet-undiscovered knowledge about Shakespeare's life. One of his letters tells us that Shakespeare was planning to leave for Virginia, where he hoped to restore his family's fortunes.

Several projects have been initiated over the years to rediscover these hidden stories. For instance, as part of a fascinating initiative called 'The Lost Letter Project', a letter written by Lt. Joseph O. Matthews was delivered to his family nearly seventy years after it was written. This project, through social media events and off-line exhibitions, invites public to reconnect lost letters they have stumbled upon with their rightful owners. Similarly, the National Archives of the United Kingdom, with the University of Oldenburg in Germany, has embarked on a 20-year project to digitize and catalog thousands of such lost letters from 1650 to 1815.

This empathetic approach is not new. In the years before World War I, thousands of letters handled by US postal service went undelivered because they were addressed improperly. The Dead Letter Office worked on these misguided missives where a group of skilled dead letter detectives discovered their correct destinations. India, too, has a Dead Letter Office (DLO) that has been in operation since 1837. Isn't this a poignant reminder that the power of the written word will always endure, even if the message goes undelivered?





#### **First case of Mpox**

On August 15, 2024, Sweden confirmed its first case of a

more contagious strain of Mpox, circulating in central and eastern Africa. This marks the first known infection of the strain outside Africa. On Aug 21, 2024, the World Health Organisation declared Mpox, formerly known as monkeypox, a "global public health emergency" for the second time in two years. This declaration followed an outbreak in Congo that has now spread to 12 other countries in the region. So far, more than 96% of all cases and deaths are in Congo.

#### Agreements signed

China and Vietnam inked 14 documents spanning crossborder railways to crocodile exports, after Chinese president Xi Jinping met with Vietnam's new leader To Lam in Beijing. Lam's visit to Beijing, his first overseas trip since he was appointed party chief early this month, signals a desire between the two communist neighbours to strengthen ties as trade and investment grow in the region. The State Bank of Vietnam and the People's Bank of China also signed a MoU on enhancing cooperation and information exchange in banking operations.



#### Luxury yacht sinks

British tech tycoon Mike Lynch, his 18-

year-old daughter, and Jonathan Bloomer, chairman, Morgan Stanley International are among the six people missing after a luxury yacht sank off the coast of the Italian island of Sicily. The 183-feet vessel was carrying 22 people including British, American and Canadian nationals. Local media reported the vacht, named Bayesian, capsized after encountering a heavy storm that caused waterspouts, or rotating columns of air, to appear over the sea.





## C\* TURKEY

#### Ancient city square found

Archaeologists have uncovered a 2,200-year-old agora, or city square in the ancient city of Aigai, Manisa, West Turkey. The agora includes bull-headed reliefs and inscriptions tied to Apollo, a significant deity in ancient mythology. The discovery is part of ongoing excavations at the 2,700-year-old site, led by professor Yusuf Sezgin from Manisa Celal Bayar University, who has been working there for 21 years.





#### T20 moved to UAE

The ICC moved the upcoming Women's T20 World Cup from Bangladesh to the UAE, saying it 'wasn't feasible' to conduct the event there after governments of a number of participating countries advised against travelling to the unrest-hit nation. The event which will also feature India, will now be staged in Dubai and Sharjah with Bangladesh retaining the hosting rights, ensuring that it receives its share of revenue.





#### **Polio threat resurfaces**

During a routine surveillance operation in Meghalaya's West Garo Hills district, health officials identified a two-year-old child exhibiting symptoms of poliomyelitis. For further analysis, a specialised team of doctors from the World Health Organization has arrived in the area. Their mission is to collect samples and determine the nature of the virus involved, whether it is the wild poliovirus or a circulating vaccine-derived poliovirus.





#### **E-scooters banned**

Melbourne officials have banned electric scooter rentals, citing safety concerns following hundreds of complaints and accident reports as the reason for the move. On August 20, 2024, Melbourne's council voted to end contracts with its two e-scooter operators, Lime and Neuron, giving them 30 days to remove their scooters. Mayor Nicolas Reece stated this decision aims to restore safety to the city's footpaths.

My journey began at AIIMS, where access to advanced equipment and technology sharpened my skills. I specialised in corneal, cataract, and refractive surgeries, which was further enriched during my time at Georgetown University. A strong foundation, I believe, is the bedrock of success.

#### **Dreams come true**

My vision was to establish a super-speciality organisation in eye care, making cuttingedge technology more accessible beyond the confines of AIIMS. Today, Centre for Sight has around 80 branches across 16 states and 32 cities in India, with over 210 dedicated doctors. We pioneered in introducing Zyoptix (Bladeless LASIK) and Phakic IOLs in India, and we led the way with Small Incision Lenticule Extraction (SMILE) as well. We initiated the Village Adoption Programme, aiming to prevent and treat avoidable blindness in rural areas.

A doctor's life is filled with unforgettable moments, but none compare to restoring someone's sight. One such moment for me was performing surgery on a 27-day-old

Treating patients with severe eye conditions, particularly those facing blindness, is heart-wrenching. Yet, during surgery, it's crucial to remain focused and undistracted. It's essential for a surgeon to control emotions to ensure the best possible outcome.

**Awareness helps always** It's crucial to limit screen time for children

to prevent eye problems. Regular eye checkups in schools are equally important. Sunlight exposure reduces the risk of myopia. So, in Singapore, a law mandates 90 minutes of outdoor activity in schools. Raising awareness about diabetic retinopathy, glaucoma, and cataracts is also vital. Simple practices like avoiding firecrackers and being cautious with colours during Holi can reduce eye injuries.

The tech: Wi-Fi The inventor: Vic Hayes and IEEE

How was it invented? Wi-Fi is a technology that allows wireless communication between devices over a local area network (LAN) using radio waves. The true idea of Wi-Fi started to take shape when NCR Corporation and AT&T Corporation created WaveLAN, a Wi-Fi forerunner. Often referred to as the

'Father of Wi-Fi', Vic Hayes, an engineer at NCR Corporation, chaired the IEEE (Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers) committee responsible for developing the 802.11 standard, which served as the foundation for what we now know as Wi-Fi. He played a key role in the standardisation of wireless LAN technology.

#### When did we get to know it first?

In 1997, the first commercial Wi-Fi products based on the IEEE 802.11 standard were released by a company called Lucent Technologies, a result of the divestiture of AT&T's equipment and research divisions, and were marketed as WaveLAN. These early Wi-Fi

products offered wireless connectivity for computers and other devices. In 1999, the Wi-Fi Alliance was formed and they introduced the term 'Wi-Fi', a consumer-friendly brand name for wireless LAN products. The Wi-Fi Alliance started certifying Wi-Fi products for interoperability and promoting the adoption of Wi-Fi technology.

#### Why do we use it?

Wi-Fi provides wireless connectivity, allowing devices to connect to the internet or communicate with each other without the need for physical wired connections. It enables convenient and flexible access to the internet, supports the interconnectivity of various devices, and enables wireless communication in homes, offices, and public spaces. It enables mobility and compatibility making it a ubiquitous technology for seamless and wireless internet access.

#### How has it helped our lives?

Wi-Fi has greatly enhanced our lives in numerous ways. It has transformed our lives



OTT platforms, with their glossy allure and instant gratification, have become the cultural touchstone of a generation. For teenagers, navigating this complex landscape is akin to traversing a labyrinth, where self-identity often becomes entangled with the projected realities of OTT platforms.

Beneath the surface of entertainment lies a more Machiavellian influence. The carefully crafted narratives, often designed to appeal to the broadest audience, can inadvertently shape young minds, moulding their perceptions of beauty, success, and relationships. For a teenager grappling with self-image, the constant bombardment of airbrushed perfection can be devastating. The line between aspiration and disillusionment blurs, leaving young individuals questioning their own worth.

The danger lies in the subtle erosion of critical thinking. As young minds are inundated with pre-packaged opinions and lifestyles, the ability to form independent thoughts becomes increasingly challenging. The fear of dissenting from the popular narrative can stifle creativity and individuality. From 'One Tree Hill' to 'Gossip Girl', as adolescents, often we have committed the mistake of formulating opinions based on films and television shows because we relate to them. We put ourselves in the shoes of OTT characters, since content creators have the powerful ability to convince the audience of what may be the 'truth' or what is right or



wrong in each context. It is highly important that we as teenagers, learn to distant ourselves from such virtual life content, every now and then, to know if our judgement is reliable or compromised. We can encourage creation of blogs like 'Beyond the filter', to voice our opinions relative to our immediate reality. It's imperative to recognise that while OTT platforms offer a window to the world, they are not a mirror of reality. Teenagers must develop the discernment to separate fact from fiction, to question the messages they consume, and to cultivate their own perspectives. Encouraging critical media literacy is crucial. By engaging in open dialogue about the impact of OTT content, parents, educators, and society at large can empower young people to become conscious consumers. Platforms that foster critical

thinking, such as book clubs, debate teams, and art programs, can provide essential counterbalances to the passive consumption of digital media. By cultivating a strong sense of self and a critical eye, teenagers can break free from the constraints of the digital age and become the architects of their own narratives.

It is time to amplify teen voices, to nurture a generation of critical thinkers who can navigate the complexities of the digital world with confidence and resilience. 




