How challenging is it to head the world's largest professional accountancy body?

I have been working with the organisation since 1996 and feel very passionately about it. Being the CEO of the organisation is a tough job indeed, but it's enjoyable too. I have had four fulfilling years in a row as the CEO of ACCA. We deal with different, complex markets everyday which demand extreme patience. However, it becomes easy to overcome the challenges when

You faced criticism for joining at the top level without any qualification in accountancy. What compensated for the lack of it?

I think holding a degree is a great foundation for any career and I would have loved to hold a degree in accountancy. But, there are other things that matter eventually, such as your leadership skills and the vision to take the organisation forward. I am more focused on delivering results. When you strive to achieve what you want, people quickly forget whatever handicap one has, whether it is

It was a great surprise and helped nurture and showcase my ability as a CEO on a global level. Everybody within the organisation and friends around the world were delighted when I received the award. I think awards and recognitions are very important and inspiring as they motivate you to work harder and stretch your boundaries even further.

What is your advice to those who want to make a career in accountancy?

Lunar sale



bia, Dubai and USA.


