
A voice for the unspoken

Artistic Expressions

Join Smita Jain, GT Network in a candid tête-à-tête with leading contemporary artist Krishen Khanna. Read on to know more about the life and works of the legend who has been bestowed with Padma Shri in 1990 and Lalit Kala Ratan in 2004 for his paintings that are a reflection of the real world...

Tell us about your foray into the world of modern art.

As a child, I was always interested in painting. My father always encouraged me to pick up the brush & easel and explore the beautiful world of colours. He himself enjoyed painting. My residence housed some truly amazing pieces of art. All these worked in communion to develop and further strengthen my love for painting. I held my first exhibition with other artists from the Progressive Artist Group in Mumbai in 1949.

Did you receive any formal education

I am largely a self taught artist. I have spent a considerable part of my childhood at Lahore and attended evening classes in art at Mayo School of Art. Though, I did not receive any formal education in the subject, I was chosen to teach the subject in the United States of America. I was awarded the Rockefeller Fellowship in the year 1962 and bestowed with the title 'Artist in Residence' at American University in Washington in 1963-64.

Virtual art galleries are the rage today. Your take...

It is very difficult to appreciate colours and textures in the virtual world. For an art connoisseur, it is important to minutely observe various elements that constitute art. So, I personally do not support the idea of virtual art galleries.

What made you give up a lucrative career as a banker and take up painting? I worked with Grindlays Bank for more than 14 years and was very happy the way my career was taking off there. An invitation to join the Progressive Artist Group and my own ardour for painting changed the entire course of my life. My love for art and colour soared above my own professional success.



Which has been your favourite work of art so far?

It is very difficult to pick one, every painting narrates an emotion. However, one painting that I would like to specially mention is the scene of conversation between an army general and a politician. Though, it might appear that they are talking peace but in reality, they are discussing war and money. It is currently on display in Jerusalem.

Do you think that the recent curb on freedom of expression will affect artists? Every artist should have the freedom to depict art in its pristine form and should not be bound by any tenets. Every piece of art narrates a truth about a situation, which is beauty in itself. However, artists should ensure that their work does not outrage anyone. GT

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

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Facing an interview

Does the word 'interview' send shivers down your spine? Try these time tested tips to crack even the most difficult ones and get your dream job

t's not only the mastery in subject or apt body language coupled with high confidence level Lathat helps in cracking an interview, there are other factors at play too. Here are some useful tips in the form of Do's and Don'ts that can create a favourable impression on the interviewer and work wonders for the candidate on the crucial day.

Do's:

Be well prepared: Do enough research on the relevant subject. You may even rehearse/ role play before the interview. Check out the journey details

beforehand to arrive well in time for the interview. Body language: Make sure that you are dressed appropriately and comfortably; shake hands warmly and develop a friendly and open approach towards the interviewer; smile when you feel it is appropriate to generate some warmth. Sit comfortably and try to look confident. Listen intently, carefully and look directly at the interviewers. Always let the interviewers take the lead.

Play it smart: Use positive phrases such as 'I am confident that ...' rather than 'I think I could.....'; to emphasize the positive aspects of the challenges you have met while playing down the negative. Always elaborate on what the interviewer seems interested in. Have a mental list of things you need to


Make sure that you are dressed comfortably; shake hands warmly and adopt a friendly approach towards the interviewer.

know about the job. If relevant, ask questions about them upon the conclusion of the interview. Ask for a question to be repeated or rephrased if you have not understood it. Allow yourself some thinking time by asking 'time- gaining' phrases up your sleeve such as, "That is an interesting question!" Admit if you don't know the answer to a question.

Don'ts:

Look under prepared: Never say you can do something you cannot substantiate. Don't ask questions about the job which you could or should have found out answers to before. In fact, a long written list of questions for the panel isn't a very good idea. Body language: Don't sit on the edge of chair or fidget or whisper responses. Do not appear overconfident or too 'laid back' or even clutch a book or folder or sit facing a window if you have a choice of where to sit. This sends out a very negative message to the interviewer.

Appear nervous: Underplaying your abilities or giving one word, or brief answers could make you appear nervous and shaky. Instead, try and support your statements with current examples.GIT

Names+colours= Capsicum Why does the capsicum

come in different colours or who painted the peppers and why they are like that? Jaysheel Buddhadeo, Amiown, Class Nursery D, curiously enquires. Read

on to find out what his mother shares with him

here is much more to be discovered about the wonderful capsicum than just its colours that resemble a traffic light. For starters, the Capsicum is also popularly known as Bell pepper or Sweet pepper or just Pepper. A rich source of Vitamin C, the capsicums are favourably grown in warm soil. Cultivators of the plant produce the fruit in different colours, like red, yellow, orange, chocolate brown, green, lilac, ivory and deep purple.


Bell peppers got their name because of their bell-shape and are grouped as a less pungent pepper of all the varieties, and so the name- Sweet pepper. The capsicum is more commonly sold as green, yellow and red. Its existence in different colours is

mainly because of its growth order and the difference in maturity levels. Green bell peppers are harvested before they ripe and continue to first turn yellow and then red if left on the plant to mature. The green bell peppers have a slightly bitter flavour and are also less expensive in the market. The orange and yellow bell pep-

pers are more mature than the green ones, thus they have a fruity taste and are not as commonly found. Red bell peppers are the most mature form of the fruit. They contain almost eleven times more beta-carotene and one and a half times more vitamin C than green bell peppers. They have a sweet fruity taste. Bell peppers become milder as they mature and ripen even after harvest. They have a long shelf life. Most capsicums are glossy, smooth skinned and blocky in appearance. Cultivated worldwide, the capsicum contains seven times more Vitamin C then the daily recommended dose of 100gms of Vitamin C. The capsicum is best stored in an airtight plastic bag in the refrigerator so as to keep it fresh for long. GI


It's Barbeque Nation

That's what brothers Ankit and Ayush Raheja, AIS Pushp Vihar, Classes VI A and VID respectively did on their grandfather's birthday as they planned out an elaborate dinner with family to Barbeque Nation, India's first live grill restaurant in Jangpura, New Delhi. Join them as they share their wonderful culinary experience

Warm look: As you enter the place, much excited, you witness a lively crowd of over a hundred plus people munching their time away to glory. The restaurant's ambience is in shades of beige and brown, with the yellow lights, wooden tables and cushioned chairs. And if you believe in making prior reservations like my mother, you wouldn't have to wait to find your place for the evening. So, it's warm in a welcoming way too.

Live grill: The restaurant has a grill embedded in the center of every table. The USP is that one gets to cook the snacks ordered by them, themselves. The trick is that there is coal underneath the grill section of the table that allows us to further enjoy



the sizzles of the almost (say, 90%) cooked food as it is barbequed. The live grill at each table also allows us to give the final finishing touch (in a personalised way), using our favorite marinade on our snack. This special feature, not easily spotted at other restaurants has caught the fancy of customers.

Piping hot menu: So whether it is the *paneer tikka*, mushroom, pineapple or haryali seekh kebab, we can baste, rotate and cook it according to our personal tastes and savour them piping hot, always.

Beverage chill pill: Out of a range of drinks, a few new twists are also available to be tried, like the blue mocktail with coconut water. Only if you have

the thirst to experiment, this is your thing.

Fixed price scheme: The restaurant keeps introducing various schemes and offers to serve their customers better. One that we checked out had a range of delicious sounding soups with the usual classics, like the Tomato Shorba and Cream of Mushroom. The grill snack portion of the menu is supplemented by an open buffet that includes a salad bar, gravy dishes, biryani and more. However, after a bellyful of yummy grilled snacks, there's little probability that you would go munching on the dinner spread at large.





How did you get associated with this cause?

I strongly believe that an ounce of action is worth more than a ton of thoughts. A chance meeting with the students from Saksham Daksh School during Amity Youth Fest made me work for this noble cause. After spending some time with these children, I asked their teacher if I could help them in any way. It's been a year since then.

What is your contribution to the cause?

I see myself as a mediator between Saksham Daksh School and the other helping hands in Amity University. I feel happy to share that I was able to rope in a number of students of various departments of the university as volunteers. They gladly stepped in to work for the cause. Together with students of Amity Institute of Social Sciences, I volunteered for a program organized by Xavier's Resource Centre for Visually Challenged (XRCVC). I also intend to take up translation of texts into Braille during vacations. I do not know how much change I have made in the lives of the children, but I can definitely say that it has made some difference in my life.

You have worked closely with children who are visually impaired. Do you see a difference between them and children with a normal eyesight?

There is no difference really; the difference lies in the perception of people towards them. We tend to think that they are not as gifted and capable as others. However, the truth is that they are like any other children. They see the world in a different way and learn about the things around them using senses other than their eyes. If there was any difference, such students would not have been able to seek admission to normal schools after their training in Saksham. But it is disheartening to know most schools don't accept them until they are compelled to do so by rule or law.

What message would you like to give Amity students?

Mobilize all our resources in a systematic way to tackle the vexing issues plaguing the society. As far as I am concerned, there is a lot to be done and I need your support. So, I'd like to invite readers to take a stand and work towards giving these children a life they deserve. GI





- Store the chocolates in a clean and cool place. Homemade chocolates are ready to relish. ■



SpyBike to nab thieves

Despite the fact that over 10,000 cases of vehicle theft are reported alone in Karnataka, the police are now breathing a sigh of relief, all thanks to Tcop-bike security or anti-theft bike immobilizer on the mobile. This new technology comes in four versions, the most advanced one has the ability to send an SMS alert when ignition is on and locate the bike if lost. In case the ignition is turned on, as SMS alert will be sent to the owner's mobile phone. When the owner realises that it is not him who started the bike, he can send an SMS back to the equipment attached to the bike seat and the ignition will be disabled. Not just this, one can also identify the bike location.

Planet X- A new addition in the solar system?

stronomers have found evidence that suggests Aa planet four times the size of Earth may be skirting the edges of the solar system beyond Pluto. The planet, which is too distant to be easily spotted by earth- based telescopes, could be gravitationally tugging on small icy objects past Neptune, helping explain the mystery of those objects' having peculiar orbits, the scientists said. The claim has been made by Rodney Gomes, a noted astronomer at the national observatory of Brazil in Rio de Janeiro. He presented his computer models that suggest the existence of a distant planet at a meeting of the American Astronomical society in Timberland Lodge recently. Other astronomers have found Gomes' arguments compelling, but said much more evidence in needed before the hypothetical planet can be said as real.





Zinc- the new wonder drug

Zinc supplements work wonders for children suffering from serious bacterial infections. The first study to assess the efficiency of zinc given in addition to standard antibiotic therapy for suspected serious bacterial infections such as pneumonia, sepsis, and meningitis has found that children who were given zinc were 40% less likely to experience treatment failure than those given placebo.

A lamp that runs on human blood

n American designer, Amike Thompson has come up with an eerie lamp which exudes a blue glow when powered by human blood. To set the lamp aglow, one needs to break the top off, use the jagged glass to cut yourself and pour the blood where it reacts with the chemicals. According to



Thompson, as the bulb is meant for only one time use, it's an attempt to 'make us think twice' about our disposable society. He said an average American uses 3383kwh of energy per year, which is same as leaving the light on in 4 rooms for 12 months. GI
