

Tomatoes on red alert

With sky high price, the indispensable tangy fruit is now protected by armed guards deployed with guns as fear of being looted lurks around

'is one letter that every government dreads. No, it is not 'O for opposition' (that can still be dealt with. It is 'O for onions' that makes them cry; it has on three occassions, brought down governments. But this time, it is tomatoes that seems to be giving government nightmares. Yes, the innocent, tangy tomatoes! With prices as high as Rs 100/kg, the zesty red fruit has managed to issue a red alert nationwide.

Tomatoes are sour

The *subzi* went without tomatoes. And now Mc Aloo Tikki is following suit. Mc Donald's - the world's largest burger chain has announced that all its burgers and wraps will go sans the tangy vegetable. The reason - soaring prices. Till last month, tomatoes was available for Rs 25/kg which is now up by four times. Well, looks like it's a case of sour tomatoes for the time being.

Not all GOOD

The reasons for increase in prices of tomatoes are manifold. However, most fingers point to GST. If economic analysts are to be believed, the imposition of Goods and Services Tax (GST) is responsible for pushing tomato prices in the country. With GST in tow, the amount of taxes has increased for several vegetable suppliers. In order to avoid the increased taxes, many vendors have cut down on their regular bookings. In fact, many of them have not even registered on GST Network, and hence are sticking to less conspicuous lines of supply, which eventually cuts down the quantity being supplied.

Save for a rainy day

The local vendors primarily blame this year's monsoon after GST, for escalating tomato prices. The heavy rainfall has affected the supply chain, in turn, pushing prices further. The heavy rainfall has largely disrupted the supply from states – Madhya Pradesh,



Maharashtra, Andhra Pradesh, Karnataka and Tamil Nadu.

The price of tomatoes go up every year in the off-season from June-September. However, this year the price rise has been steep due to the damage caused to the rabi crop due to severe drought in southern states.

Shelved

The shelf-life of tomatoes is not more than four days and not all retailers across India have an access to cold storage. As a result, they usually tend to recover the cost by selling at a higher price. Also, the stock spoils easily during the rain. Thus, the current stock is supplied from Himachal Pradesh, which increases costs.

Red alert

"It pinches to buy tomatoes at soaring prices. However, I refuse to switch to tomato puree considering its high content of sodium and preservatives in it. Without compromising on nutrition value, now paneer curry is replaced by *paneer tikka* and grilled veggies, *daal* by *kadhi*."







n the past few years, artificial intelligence, or AI, has gained centre stage in almost all technological conversations. From Siri in our phones to flying drones being developed for military use, scientific circles are abuzz with what is often referred to as human-like robots. However, as useful as artificial intelligence may be, it is hardly immune to mistakes, and more importantly, it isn't capable of taking any logical decisions on However, the biggest void in this

One of the examples that show how AI can go awry is when last year in March, Microsoft released its AI on Twitter, Tay, the software giant had to shut it down immediately "due to concerns with its inability to recognise when it was making offensive or racist statements". The launch had marked the beginning of a new era, but it misfired as the bot started tweeting alarmingly racist and misogynis-

tic remarks in less than 24 hours of its launch. The Twitter population had effectively turned the AI, which was programmed to 'learn' from the conversations around it, into a sexist and antisemitic hate monger.

This incident triggered a debate around AI, since they were created to replicate human intelligence. In layman's words, an artificial intelligence program can be 'taught' behaviour, the way children at an early age are taught manners and behaviour. case is that while children grow up and learn critical thought, AI's don't, meaning they will go on repeating whatever we tell them to - be it the right wing propaganda or information about every flavour of Baskin Robbins.

And because these programs learn from the conversations around them, most of which are hardly well thought out or even reasonable, it is no surprise that we find software like these turning hateful so many times.

A possible solution to this could be to incorporate social sciences into artificial intelligence development. Since most software designers are from computer science background, they often tend to leave out important social concepts when making AI programs. It has a disastrous effect on children, and not just girls, which translates into the damaging generation. The tradition is prevalent on a large scale among people of lower strata. Female foeticide: It is extremely unfortunate that despite several awareness campaigns by the government and door-to-door activities by NGOs, female foeticide is still practiced in the country. This can be attributed to social evils like dowry that make people think of the girl child

Lack of education: A majority of the Indian population is still uneducated, which is the root cause of most social evils. They are not aware of the rights of a girl. Besides, they do not have any information about the various initiatives being taken by government agencies and NGOs to support the girl child. With education in place, these obstacles can easily be

Gender sensitisation: If we want to bring women to the fore, the key lies in gender sensitisation. In my opinion, gender sensitisation begins at home. Parents often divide chores among their children on the basis of gender. For

instance, girls would be asked to take care of the kitchen, while boys are encouraged to take outdoor responsibilities. If we discontinue such discrimination, we will be able to usher a change in the

He for she: In a patriarchal society like ours, men are mostly calling the shots at home. So, if we look at the larger picture, they can actually play an important role in empowering women by encouraging them at every step of their lives.

Unlike West, where a man and woman play an equal role in household chores, there are taboos associated with Indian men doing household chores. The attitude hasn't changed over the years. Even though



have women become financially independent, they are still expected to take charge of household work. To create an equal society, men should support women by stepping up for household responsibilities. It's time to flip the saying, 'behind every successful man is a woman'.
