Why is it called JUNO?

The name has its origin from Greco-Roman mythology. Jupiter, the supreme God often referred as the God of sky and lightning, used to form clouds around himself to hide his mischief but his wife, Goddess Juno, was able to see his real character through the clouds. JUNO is a similar effort to study planet Jupiter. And for good luck, JUNO spacecraft carries with it a 1.5-inch figurine of Galileo Galilei, the Roman God Jupiter and his wife JUNO. The

inclusion of the three mini-statues is part of a partnership between

NASA and the LEGO Group to inspire children to explore.

What is JUNO?

JUNO is a robotic spacecraft, also known as a space probe, which is used for exploring space and planets like Jupiter. From taking pictures to collecting soil, it helps scientists to understand our universe better. Some of the notable space probes are- Curiosity Rover (Mars), Mangalyaan (Mars) mission by ISRO and Apollo Mission to the Moon.

> Why scientists want to study Jupiter? The volume of Jupiter is 1300 times greater than Earth. Its mass is two and a half times that of all the other planets in the solar system combined. Because of its huge mass, magnetic field and gravitational force, it is believed that the formation of other planets in the universe are influenced by Jupiter. Also, composition of Jupiter has remained unchanged since the formation of solar system unlike other planets. The research will help to solve the mystery and history of the 5 billion years old solar system.

What is net neutrality?

Net neutrality means that Internet Service Providers should enable access to all content and applications regardless of the source, and without favouring or blocking particular products or websites. It is the 'right to equality' of the digital world. The idea was derived from the operation of telephone services. Just as you are allowed to make calls to anyone you wish regardless of the operators, net neutrality allows you to access any application or web service without any interference from the Internet Service Providers.

Why net neutrality?

From the inception of the internet, net neutrality was more of a norm than a clearly established rule. Since it was a new concept, it was important that ideas were allowed to flow freely for its success. And also because the potential of internet was not realised back then and hence, no clearly defined rules and regulations oversaw its functioning. Net neutrality also allowed a level playing field to various ideas from the world over. Internet giants like Facebook and Google had humble beginnings.
