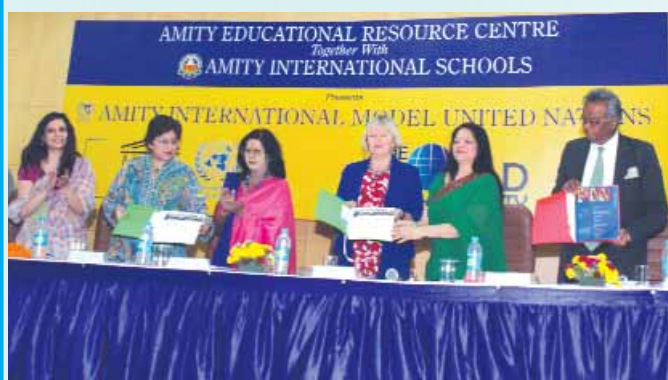

*According to you, what other procedures can be included in MUN to make it more efficient?*

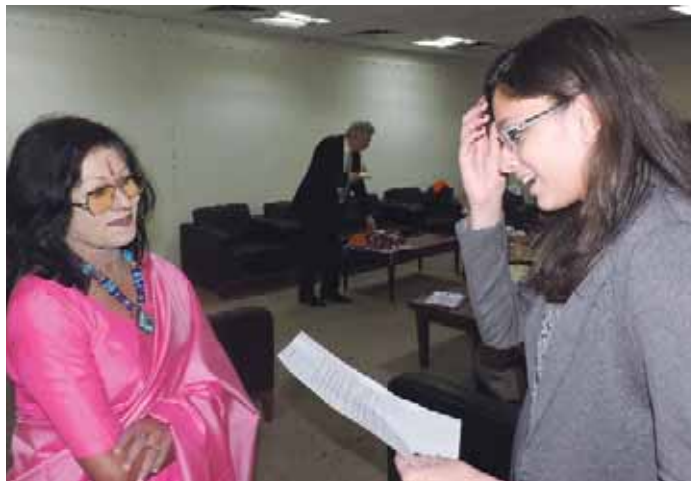

## Small things, big change

**How does it feel to be associated with a prestigious organisation as UNESCO?** It's exhilarating and tiring at the same. I mean it feels amazing to be associated with UNESCO and I often feel that I'm being paid for having fun. But overall, I feel proud to be a part of the United Nations.

**Do you think MUNs help students become better citizens?**

Getting people to think of global issues, humanity or wondering if our own present system of negotiation is the right mechanism are some of the few things MUN focuses on. I feel simulations like these help people to focus on the small things that will help in bringing about a big change.

**Other than MUNs, what other methods do you suggest to promote world peace and harmony?**

One key factor that affects our way of thinking is experience. Education, these days, focuses more on textual matter rather than promoting global relationships as such. We need to give students opportunities where they can experience global relationships first-hand and realise for themselves the significance of global peace and harmony.

**Being an economist, how do you think India can improve its status from that of a developing nation to that of a developed one?**

Firstly, get over this term of a developing nation. To think that you are a developed nation, is half the battle won. GDP should not be used as a means of measuring development. **Day 1** As excited delegates proceeded towards the committee hall, the thrill and nervousness in the atmosphere was palpable. The day started with a doubt-clarification session by the Executive Board. This was followed by a voting session where the agenda ‘Extra judicial killings & arbitrary executions’ was voted in. Enthusiasm levels soared as special guest A Parsuramen, former director UNESCO, graced the committee and inspired the delegates with his words. The day progressed with several assertions being made on various countries regarding capricious killings. With the legality of several US prisons being questioned, the delegate of USA failed to defend the country’s stance.

**Day 2** With more research in their kitty, the delegates were all set to make an

impression. The delegates decided to take up several case studies of massacres, such as Guantanamo Bay. This was also the time for the crisis to descend upon the committee. A horrid ISIS video of the beheading of a US aid worker was released. Threats of military attack by the allied forces ensued and allegations on the MENA nations were piled. Several member nations sparked accusations and questioned the legitimacy of the videos so released by the ISIS, some even hinting that the US was behind the videos.

**Day 3** As the session commenced on the final day, it was evident that everyone wanted to leave a mark on the committee that had given them adequate doses of diplomacy and debate. In the three resolutions submitted to the Executive Board, there were solutions that concerned both the agenda and the crisis. These included sanctions of drone attacks and provision of aid to countries under terrorist attack, besides others. Upon hearing the resolutions, several countries such as Republic of Korea and United Kingdom threatened to retaliate. However, the committee voted against all the three resolutions. In technical terms, it would be termed as the committee ‘failing’, but the Chairperson valiantly declared the committee a success, since the sessions saw some intense debate and discussion. On the whole, this year’s UNHRC was a force to reckon with, rekindling the faith that humanity was alive, as was conspicuous in the debate.

**Day 1** As the committee commenced with 89 present member nations, a vote was carried out and the agenda ‘Sustainable energy for all’ was voted in. During the debate, many delegates like the Delegate of France and the Delegate of Russia spoke up with strong voices, focusing on the urgent need to start projects regarding sustainable energy. The speakers also highlighted the fact that such projects should have been started ages ago, considering the kind of technology that was available. The general speaker’s list continued with the debate about the grave need of sustainable energy for all. The day concluded with an unmoderated caucus that saw the delegates discussing the proceedings for the next session.

**Day 2** The delegates were well prepared for the proceedings of the second

day, and very veraciously discussed the ‘barriers for sustainable energy’ in a moderated caucus. The delegates discussed how strong these barriers were, and how they could be overcome. The delegates brought to the committee’s notice the pivotal need for the installation of new set-ups like that of wind energy and solar energy, in appropriate locations. The day ended with the commencement of the resolution making process, which saw the formation of three blocs. Each bloc presented its own resolution.

**Day 3** On the concluding day, the delegates of General Assembly proceeded with the discussion of the resolution presented by the delegates of France, USA and UK. The sponsors of the resolution presented a detailed and lengthy explanation of every clause of the resolution, following a request by all the delegates present in the committee. One of the main clauses of the proposed resolution, was the recommendation to bring enhanced technical devices to their countries, which not only provide sustainable energy, but can also be afforded by the economically weaker countries. The General Assembly managed to efficiently cater to the needs of not just the advanced nations, but also the technically backward ones. This challenge was conquered by laying emphasis on out-of-the-box solutions.

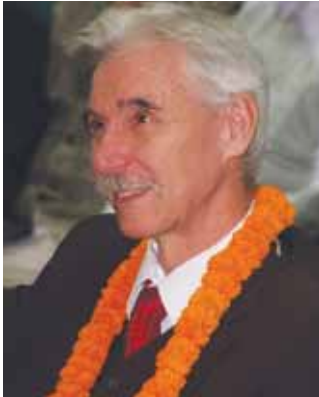

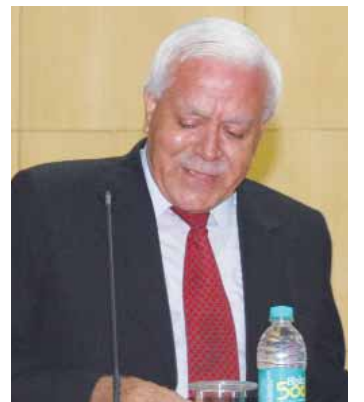

## Proceedings

**Day 1** The committee was set to discuss what gave rise to the 'hawala' system aka the 'informal money transfer systems'. Temperatures started rising as blame games took center stage. Questions were raised on the legalisation of certain aspects of these systems. The delegates of Russian Federation, China, UK and PRC became the countries to watch out for, in the room full of waving placards and the conference staff wheezing around the committee passing chits here and there. The pandemonium that ensued, took the committee by storm.

**Day 2** The conference began with a bang amidst intense and heated debates. Many gavels shook the floor as delegates locked horns from serious issues to even the minutest matters as tea. The second day came with a bag full

of surprises. The committee went headlong to deal with a crisis at hand, which involved the kidnapping of Bilawal Bhutto Zardari and nuclear research papers being stolen by the ISIS. The delegates were given the option to recover only one thing- either Bilawal Bhutto or nuclear research papers. There was an intense face-off between DRC and Russian Federation after DRC claimed that they were planning a covert operation with the help of Russia. However, the Russian Federation denied the claim outright, saying they didn't know of any such operation being carried out.

After a lot of debate and discussion, the committee opted to save the life of Bilawal Bhutto while they released the press report. With such a dramatic crisis at hand, the committee was no less interesting than a Hollywood suspense thriller.

**Day 3**

The third day was devoted to the resolution making process. Two different resolutions were created, one headed by the delegates of Russia, Serbia, China and Croatia and the other resolution was headed by the delegates of Pakistan, India and UK. The resolution of Russia, Serbia, China and Croatia was put forward first. Unfortunately, hopes of their resolution passing were dimmed after the President found a punctuation error in clause 10 and as a result of that, all the following clauses were scrapped. After the scrapping of the clauses and great editing, their resolution was finally passed by the committee and thus, came the end of a successful session.

**Day 1** Shortly after settling, former ambassador of Sweden, Kazakhstan and Latvia, Ashok Sajjanhar addressed the committee and discussed current global issues. tions. Delegates decided to submit working papers by the end of the day.

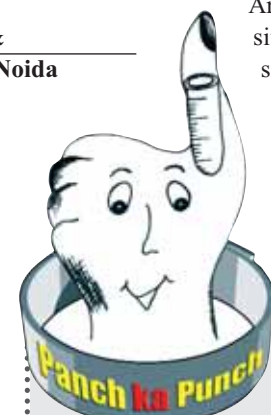

According to an investigation report the materials required for production of centrifuges were being carried to a location approximately 22 km away from the Arak facility in Iran, suspected to be for off-site production. However, the agreement signed between the P5+1 nations and Iran didn't prohibit Iran from offside production but their installation. The crisis was followed by submission of working papers which were discussed till committee proceedings elapsed. The committee members started forming blocs and put their convincing powers to test.

**Day 3**

The last day added to the chaos. With delegates deciding not to cooperate, fiery arguments ruled the roost. During procedural voting, delegates were either abstaining from voting or voting for both - for and against- leading to further delays. The delegates were asked to submit a press release after tea break and they started working on it enthusiastically. Then, the committee moved on to resolution making. However, controversies arose as delegates preferred debating with the Chair instead of themselves which ended in the failure of both the resolutions. Feedback session and stealing of placards, brought the day to an end.

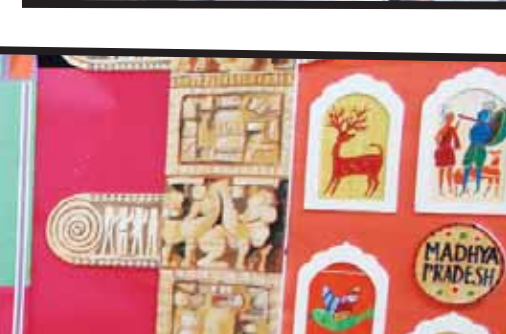

**Day 1** The committee started on an enthusiastic note with all the delegates ready to enter the gates of past and resolve the issue. The session commenced with the EB clarifying doubts of all the delegates. The debate started with countries like USSR and Egypt debating fiercely upon the nationalisation of the Suez Canal while the powerful countries like US and France contradicted the same idea. A moderated caucus followed that saw discussion about the legalisation of Suez Canal. An unmoderated caucus followed suit, wherein 3 blocs were formed. However, it was only the developed nations (a special mention to the delegate of USA) that seemed to dominate the debate on the first day.

The day ended amidst debate and discussion and much rebuking by the Chair who asked the delegates to maintain diplomatic courtesy.

**Day 2**

The committee showed tremendous improvement on the second day as delegates of both small and big countries started to participate in the debate with great passion and enthusiasm. A fusillade of accusations and counter-accusations along with fact based debating shook the committee. However, it was USSR that took the lead and thus began a moderated caucus, discussing if countries like USA should interfere in the crisis when not directly involved. The committee wasn't able to come to concrete solutions. Later, the EB opened room for back door negotiations. France and USSR tried to persuade the smaller countries to be allies with them. The day ended with high hopes for having a reliable resolution by end of the third day.

**Day 3**

The day started with the opening of the Provisional Speakers List (PSL) which led to a fiery debate as the delegates now had a clear vision of what exactly was to be done. As the committee worked towards forming a reliable resolution, it was clear that 2 blocs had emerged. One bloc consisted of USSR and the Arab League while the other bloc included USA, UK and France. There was an hour long informal debate which resulted in the formation of 4 different communiqués, which further resulted in 2 resolutions. Though the committee ended with no viable resolution, the intellectual debate more than made up for it.

**Day 1** The committee commenced with the guest of honour, A. Parsuramen, former director, UNESCO, highlighting the relevance of MUN in global view-point. The Security Council was modelled on continuous crises of the presently functioning terrorist group in the Islamic states of Syria and Libya. The committee picked momentum with the introduction of the first crisis. With the beheading of a US Aid worker by the ISIS, the US got a chance to justify its actions in the Iraqi and Syrian region. US claimed that it had been bombing the region to bring peace by wiping away Islamic rebels. Questions were raised on whether its actions were justified.

**Day 2**

A new crisis update informed the delegates about the detainment and interrogation of 2 ISIS members in Brisbane, Australia. Possible attacks on Sydney and

Chicago were stated. The committee saw veering by the delegates of Iran and Iraq who held opposing views on the US military intervention in the area—Iran called for proactive participation of local combat bodies, while Iraq upheld its regard for USA as a military ally. Russia and Argentina gave points about the root cause and results of the terrorist uprising in the Middle East.

**Day 3**

The US airstrikes in Iraq had hit an ISIS convoy and allegedly, top leader Abu Bakr al-Baghdadi. While USA hailed this as victory of their peace-keeping forces; China, Russia and other delegates argued that this solved no purpose and if at all it did, the purpose would be drowned by retaliation from the ISIS. The final update was about the Chechen rebels of Russia who had conjoined with the ISIS and bombed Moscow. Bombing occurred in Beijing and an airport in Frankfurt was seized by ISIS militants. The leader of the Islamic state (played by the Dep. Secretary General) entered the premises of the SC chamber and threatened the delegates. "I'll finish all of you" was among the controversial statements he made. China and Russia insisted on stopping the airstrikes, considering the damage caused to their countries. However, USA was in denial. A resolution was passed about the economic measures to counter ISIS, focusing on the role of regional factors like Turkey, etc.

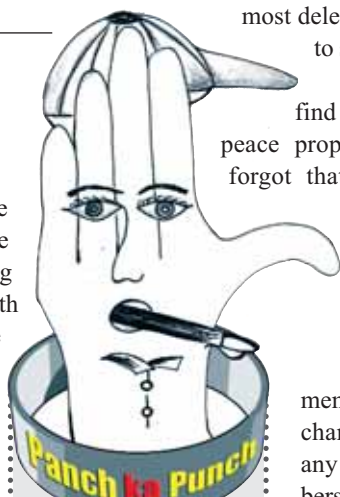


*Were the sessions joyous like the ‘high tides’ or lagggy like the ‘low tides’?*
