





My fancies are fireflies, specks of living light twinkling in the dark. The voice of wayside pansies, that do not attract the careless glance, murmurs in these desultory lines.

othing describes the beauty of the night sky lit by the warm glow of fireflies better than the above lines by poet Rabindranath Tagore. This scene is beautifully internalised in the movie 'Life of Pi' where glittering stars and glowing creatures of the night turn up in their full might to amuse a lonely Pi. Even Walt Disney's fairy Tinker Bell collects sunlight to make the fireflies glow and illuminate the night sky. Read on to know what makes these beautiful creatures glow ...

### creatures?

One may wonder who these majestic

creatures are, glowing in the night. They are not any creatures with complicated names from futuristic sci-fi movies, but found in our back yard or the vast deep oceans. Worms, squids, mushrooms, eels and even some bacterias found in the forests of West and Central Africa, Waitomo Caves and oceans are known to glow.

#### What makes them glow?

Not many people know that 80% -90% of the deep dwelling animals are bioluminous and can produce light of their own by mixing pigment luciferin with luciferase in the presence of oxygen. The high-energy molecule created by the reaction releases energy in the form of light. The green and blue light emitted by the creatures of the ocean travels far and helps them attract a mate and lure the prey.

What are bioluminescent Benefits of biolumiesence With a multitude of bioluminescent organisms, comes a wide range of

uses of the light. Some creatures use it to hunt, like the anglerfish whichuses its glow to lure its prey, while other animals use it to attract mates, camouflage themselves, and to deter predators. Here are some uses:

Locating food: Some species of the fish use this light like a spotlight to find their prey.

Attracting prey: Some species found in the depth of the ocean like anglerfish use luminescence to attract other fishes.

Communication: Fireflies flash at one another in a specific pattern to find a mate.

Camouflage: In the depth of the ocean, some species produce spots of light on their underside, which blur their outlines and allow them to blend in with light from above. This is also known as counter-illumination.

Self defence: When threatened, some animals release a cloud of bioluminescent fluid. A squid defends itself by releasing a cloud of ink.GT





Gram flour/Besan (sifted)1 cup
Baking soda 1 pinch
Turmeric powder <sup>1</sup> / <sub>4</sub> tsp
Green chilli paste (optional) <sup>1</sup> / <sub>2</sub> tsp
Salt(as per taste)

- Mix dry mango powder, coriander powder, cumin powder, red chilly powder, garam masala, salt to taste and 1 tsp water and mix well.
- Fill this mixture inside the chillies, keep aside.
- Mix gram flour, baking soda, turmeric powder, green chilli paste, turmeric powder and salt to taste to prepare a batter. Add some water to make a paste. Make sure that there are no lumps.
- Heat the oil in a pan, dip the stuffed green chillies in the batter and make sure to cover them entirely.
- Place them gently in the oil, fry on medium flame till golden brown. Your *pakodas* are ready!
- Serve with *chutney*. Enjoy!

teams from countries across the world in record breaking time.


