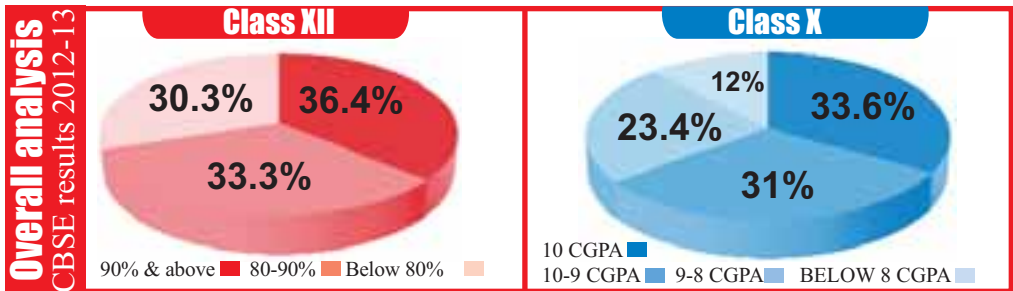

Politics



Modi anointed: Brushing aside reservations of patriarch L K Advani and some other senior leaders, the BJP on June 9 anointed Gujarat Chief Minister Narendra Modi as the Chairman of its Election Campaign Committee for the 2014 polls, a move considered just short of making him the prime ministerial candidate.

The grand split: The BJP-JD(U) alliance ended acrimoniously on June 17 over Narendra Modi's ‘coronation’ as the saffron prime ministerial

candidate. The 17 year old alliance ended on a bitter note with Bihar Chief Minister Nitish Kumar sacking all 11 BJP ministers in his cabinet and his ally-turned-foe swiftly retaliating by accusing him of betrayal. The BJP meanwhile, lost no time in warming up to its new role as the main opposition to the Kumar government calling for a statewide *bandh* to protest against a ‘betrayal of mandate’ and promising to wheel out its heavy artillery in the form of Modi. Uttarakhand deluge: On the morning of June 16, a fury of flash floods and landslides brought havoc and left behind a trail of devastation in the state of Uttarakhand. The epicentre of this calamity was Vasukital, a glacial lake at an altitude of 14,200 feet where a cloudburst occurred past the midnight of June 16. It led to overflowing of the lake causing flash floods down the hills in Kedarnath. The holy temple town of Kedarnath was the worst hit by floods. Over 5,000 people still remain stranded across the state and at least 400 are officially missing. Even as government sources say rescue operations in flood ravaged Uttarakhand could be completed in next 48 to 72 hours, a few villages still remain completely cut-off and haven't received any relief aid in the past eight days. The mass cremation of unidentified bodies have begun in Kedarnath. [G T](#)

Sharif gets third time lucky as Pakistan's PM:

Nearly 14 years after being deposed in a military coup and forced into exile, Nawaz Sharif was sworn in as Pakistan's Prime Minister for a record third term on June 6. 63-year-old Sharif was sworn in by President Asif Ali Zardari at a function at the Presidency after being formally elected as Prime Minister by an overwhelming majority in Pakistan's 342-member National Assembly. Sharif is the 27th Prime Minister of Pakistan, which has witnessed three military coups.

NSA whistleblower Snowden in limbo: Russian President Vladimir Putin says that fugitive National Security Agency leaker Edward Snowden has been in the transit zone of Moscow's Sheremetyevo air-



port since flying in from Hong Kong- meaning that he has not officially entered the country. If true, it's effectively a life of airport limbo for the 29-year-old American whistleblower who leaked the extent of US electronic surveillance on the world.

US to support Syrian rebels: The US has said it will provide military support to Syrian rebels after concrete evidences of nerve gas attacks by government forces were found against the rebel group. The assessment that limited attacks have taken place is based on CIA tests on blood, urine and hair samples of dead rebels. [G T](#)

Fast and furious: Japan has unveiled its new “levitating” bullet train, designed to travel at speeds of up to 500 kmph, it has undergone its first test on tracks. Japan's first commercial model of a magnetically levitated train has been placed on an outdoor test track. Officials at Central

Japan Railway unveiled the L0 model on June 5 at its test track in Yamanashi Prefecture. The track is being extended to 43 kms to enable full-fledged test runs. The train will travel at speeds of up to 500 kmph and will link the two cities in 40 minutes.



New Solar System: Scientists have identified a new solar system with three potentially habitable Earth-like planets orbiting a nearby star, just 22 light years away in the constellation Scorpius. A look at star Gliese 667 revealed a treasure trove of planets. [G T](#)

Delhi Airport, world's 2nd best:

Indira Gandhi International Airport has been named as the world's second best airport in the 25-40 million passengers category by the Airport Council International. The airport also has been adjudged as the fourth best in the world among 199 airports across all categories. A nine-member team, comprising representatives from airport operator Delhi International Airport Limited, Central Industrial Security Force, Airport Operations Control and Air India received the ‘ACI



ASQ Award’ at an award ceremony in Istanbul, Turkey on June 14, 2013.

Rupee slumps: The Indian rupee breached formidable resistance of 60 to the dollar to plummet to a record low on June 26, 2013. The rupee has been under pressure due to factors such as high inflation, burgeoning current account deficit and high gold imports. The currency, which was around 54 mark in the beginning of the year, has continued its fall in June after sliding 8 per cent in May. [G T](#)

CBI to quiz Jindal: The Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI), which is probing the alleged irregularities in coal allocation, has questioned former Coal Secretary HC Gupta and sent a notice to Congress Lok Sabha member and industrialist Naveen Jindal and the Jindal Group. The agency had raided the office and residential premises of Jindal. The agency also quizzed Gupta for five hours in relation to the allocations during his tenure as Coal Secretary in the

year 2008.

Maoist ambush: In one of the deadliest attacks, suspected Maoist rebels killed at least 19 people in Chattisgarh when they ambushed a convoy carrying regional Congress leaders in a dense forest on May 25. The rebels felled trees to block the 20-car convoy and then detonated a landmine and raked the vehicles with gunfire. Among those killed was Mahendra Karma, a senior Congress leader from Chattisgarh, who founded an anti- maoist group and was believed to be the main target of the attack. [G T](#)

IPL spot-fixing shame: IPL is no stranger to controversy, but on May 16, it met arguably its biggest crisis when Delhi Police arrested three Rajasthan Royals' players - Sreesanth, Ajit Chandila and Ankeet Chavan - soon after their match in Mumbai for alleged

spot-fixing. Eleven bookies were also arrested at that time, including one Amit Singh, who was a former Royals player. The Royals later suspended their players and the BCCI set up an inquiry, headed by its Anti Corruption and Security Unit (ACSU) chief Ravi Sawani, into the allegations. The board also announced enhanced anti-corruption measures, including two more security personnel with each team. The arrests kicked off a nation-wide search and arrest of bookmakers. One of those picked up in Mumbai was a small - time actor, Virender

“Vindoo” Dara Singh, arrested on charges of links with bookmakers. His testimony led to the arrest of Meiyappan Gurunath, a top official of Chennai Super Kings and son-in-law of BCCI President N Srinivasan.

Nadal swats Ferrer: Rafael Nadal, the 27-year-old Spaniard sealed his place in history by demolishing David Ferrer 6-3, 6-2, 6-3 to win the 8th French Open Singles title. Ferrer had not lost a set on his way to the final, but he could not come close to winning a set against Nadal. [G T](#)



World's oldest person dead: The world's oldest person, 116-year-old Japanese man Jiroemon Kimura, died on June 12. Kimura, who lived in Kyotango near Kyoto in western Japan, had been hospitalized for pneumonia since last month. He

Mango yoghurt fool

Chocolate cookies6

Lemon juice4-5 drops

Method

 - Peel and dice the mangoes into small cubes. Remove the remaining pulp with the help of a spoon and puree it in a blender. Add lemon juice slowly.
- Whisk the yoghurt lightly and mix icing sugar in it.
 - Crush chocolate cookies into small bits, but do not powder them.
 - In a coupe/ ice cream cup/ shot glass, pour 1 tsp of mango puree, then layer it with yoghurt. Add a layer of diced mangoes and sprinkle chocolate cookies.
 - Repeat the steps for double layering.
 - Garnish with diced mangoes sprinkled with chocolate cookies. Serve chilled.

- Saute some jealousy, parental and peer pressure and add to the mixture in the cauldron. This tempering will offset the otherwise boring and too sweet flavour of the recipe.
- Remove the cauldron from fire and transfer the mixture to a microwave safe bowl.
- Bake the mixture for several years till it acquires right consistency.
- Top it with some popularity and fashion essence. Serve hot or cold.
