s we celebrate World Press Day on May 3, the question 'is the press really free' looms large. Anwesha Sen Majumdar, GT Network analyses answers from across the world.

A pen is mightier than the sword. Or so it was once upon a time, when the pen flourished to write free spirited, unbiased and fearlessly. Political allegiances, media bashing, self censorship has left the pen smearing ink rather than shaping a free world. The recent freedom of press rankings released by Reporters Without Borders, an independent media watchdog, bears testimony to the threat to the freedom of press. The 2017 rankings showed a disturbing trend this year that of leading democracies slipping down the rink. Thankfully, there are silver linings (read

Rank No 1 Multiple ownership: Norway

This ice and snow covered country had long set the grounds for freedom in the constitution (1814). Media is rarely hounded or censored in the country, and violence is rare. One of the important reasons for Norway being a safe country is the ownership pattern. According to The Media Ownership Act (1997), leading media houses are not allowed to own more than 40% of the shares in any TV station, radio station or newspaper.

The hands of a potter need to be set free if he has to mould the clav into an artifact. Free press, devoid of any kind of allegiances, can vield similar results.

Rank No 2 Pioneer of Free Press: Sweden

Sweden was one of the first countries that understood the power of free press. In 2016, it celebrated the 250th anniversary of the world's first press freedom law (1776). Due to this law, along with freedom of press, the public have full right to access, state-held documents under the innovative principle of 'the right to information.' On the lines of RTI in India, the public/reporter can ask for full accountability for government works.

The government works for the nation. The nation pays the government. So it becomes even more important for the press to keep an eye on the expenditure. That is the hallmark of a true modern democracy.

Rank No 40 Strict laws: UK

'Heavy handed approach' towards the press has caused one of the richest economies in the world to slip to 40. It has the most extreme surveillance legislation in UK history, the Investigatory Powers Act, with insufficient protection mechanisms for whistleblowers, journalists, and their sources. Adding to the woes of reporters is the

Espionage Act which declares journalists as 'spies' and jail them for up to

ican people' while blocking White House access to multiple media outlets in retaliation for critical reporting has curbed the freedom of press; so much so that USA slipped by 2 rankings. Also the Obama administration is guilty for prosecution of whistleblowers along with travel hassles for foreign journalists.

When political leaders, at the highest echelons of power, start bashing and harassing the media at will, the integrity and resourcefulness of media gets disturbed.

Rank No 136 Increasing censorship: India

India has been clubbed in 'difficult situation' slot for its politics. With the rising tide of bombast nationalism, the media is forced to self-censor by the most radical nationalists, trolls and self-appointed morality police who vilify them and even threaten physical reprisals. Also the fear of the sedition law used by persecutors who feel a reporter is overly critical of the government or an individual, inhibits honest stories as they are often intimidated. On youth

One of the biggest things about youth is that it does not come with the baggage that many of us have as we grow older. A lot of us in the mainstream media are not really doing our duties very well. So, it is incumbent on you, the youth to take up these social issues and bring them into limelight. One strength that the youth has which it must maintain is the diversity of thinking.

On social change

Social change is a slow, laborious process. It takes years. It takes meeting people who do not always understand you. It takes engaging people who have a different set of views. But it also means that you continue to put in the effort and not leave it despite the obstacles that come your way. I think one of the best ways to bring about a social change is engagement.

On journalism

Journalism is a very hard profession. I find a lot of young people coming into journalism with completely wrong ideas. Journalism is not just about being on television, having a fan following and being recognized. Journalism today is going through a lot of upheavals. Personally, I think there are three major problems with the profession. Firstly, as I see it, journalism today covers Delhi, Bombay, Bangalore, sometimes even Calcutta and that's not India. The second big problem with journalism is that it's no longer about the story. And the third big problem with the profession is that we are all aligned towards one party or the other. We are either

On striking a balance

Balance cannot be a smokescreen. I have spoken to A and I have spoken to B, hence my story is balanced. That's not journalism. Journalism means the ability to understand why A maybe telling you the truth, while B may not. And then use your own ability, skill set and experience, connect the dots and then come up with something. Everything cannot be left to the viewer. If we leave everything to the viewer, then there is no need for the viewer to come to us.

On social activism and journalism

One needs to leave the activist outside the newsroom. But that doesn't mean that you leave the empathy and social concern. However, I don't think that a journalist can approach his work with an activist bent of mind. An activist is always looking for a certain result, like say for instance, implementation of a particular policy. Now, one might argue that isn't that what journalists also seek to do. True, but before seeking the result, a journalist needs to scrutinize. S/he needs to study the impact of the policy, which section of the audience it will effect and so on and so forth. So, being an activist can be a part of a journalist's personality but I don't think the ultimate result should guide a journalist just the way it guides an activist.

On the journey

Every journalist will always have regrets that someone beat me to a story, someone got there first, someone uncovered a story I could have.

Carrot: If Bugs Bunny gorging on carrots made you fall in love with this orange coloured veggie, then here's news. 


Amitians recognized for community service to make a difference in the society
