around the increase of pictorial warnings on cigarette packets from 40% - 85% gathers momentum, Hriday, an NGO dedicated to dissemination of health related information to youth debunks 5 myths, with facts to support the increase in the size of Pictorial Health Warnings (PHWs)

*s the debate* 

Myth 1: The increase in the size of specified health warning from 40 % to 85 % is arbitrary, excessive and unreasonable. Fact: As per Cigarettes & Other Tobacco Products Act (COTPA), Ministry of Health and Family Welfare is the competent ministry to make rules around pictorial warnings. According to the current packaging and labelling rules, the norms on warnings can be revised every 24 months. India reached this point on April 1, 2015. In compliance with this, the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare constituted an expert committee, to look at the best global practices to develop effective India specific warnings.

Myth 2: Large tobacco-producing countries (China, USA, Indonesia & Zimbabwe) do not have oversized health warnings. India being the 2nd largest producer should therefore adopt a reasonable approach.

Fact: India ranks abysmally low on global health warnings at 136th position. Argentina, which is

among the top ten tobacco producing countries, has Pictorial Health Warnings (PHWs) covering 50% of the packet, while Brazil, the third largest tobacco producing country has a PHW covering 100% of its front side. More recently, Ireland, France and UK decided to introduce plain packaging of tobacco products. India, being a world leader in Framework Convention on Tobacco Control (FCTC) negotiations, must lead the world in PHWs and take the plain packet route soon.

## Myth 3: Article 11 of FCTC states that pictorial warnings should not be less than 30% and thus, by implementing the 85% principle, India will go beyond FCTC guidelines and international norms.

Fact: Article 2(1) of the WHO-FCTC itself encourages the parties involved to go beyond the FCTC provisions and guidelines for better protection of human health. Furthermore, the guidelines to implement Article 11 of the WHO-FCTC recommend that "Given the evidence that the effectiveness of health warnings and messages increases with their size, parties should consider using health warnings and messages that cover over 50% of the principal display areas and aim to cover as much of the principal display areas as possible." Currently, India does not even meet the FCTC minimum stipulation of 30% PHW.

Myth 4: Large PHWs infringe the intellec-

# **Germinating Germanic ties**

r Alexander Hansen, director, German House for Research and Innovation (DWIH), and German Research Foundation (DFG), was conferred honourary professorship by Dr. Ashok K. Chauhan, Founder President, Amity Universe. Amlaan Kumar, XII J & Manasvini Pandya, XI J, AIS Noida struck a conversation with him...



For many years, DFG and DWIH have been jointly funding projects in India. We have been sending a group of young Indian delegates every year to Germany to meet scientists including a few Nobel laureates. Other than this, the countless research projects started by DFG and DWIH in India have ushered in a new era of Indo-German relationship.



#### What does Germany think of India as its ally?

India is currently one of the fastest developing nations in the world. It has achieved extensively in the past 10 years. It has also made immense progress in the field of science. The Mars orbiter launched by the Indian Space Research Organisation is a clear example of what India can achieve. This growth has caught the eye of many nations, who are now viewing India as an important ally, as is Germany.

#### In which areas of science and technology can India and Germany collaborate?

There are many areas where Germany and India have already been collaborating for many years. Some of them

include aero technology and medical infrastructure.

#### How is the German education system different from its Indian counterpart?

In Germany, it is of paramount importance to provide the best quality education since human resource is considered the most important resource. While India is providing quality education, achieving and sustaining the requirement is much more challenging since India has a population of 1.2 billion while Germany has a population of only 80 million.

How has DFG and DWIH contributed to the Indo-German cooperation?

#### How, in your opinion, will the new Indian government take forward the Indo-German relations?

The new Indian government is very favourable to science and research, an area that the Germans are known to be proficient in and famous for. I am sure the new government will take the Indo-German relations to new heights and strengthen ties.

## What message would you like to convey to the youth of the country?

I would like the youth to be more conscious of the international community. While Indians are now exposed to quality institutions, such as Amity, they must accept the idea of globalisation and its positive impacts. One cannot stay within the confines of his or her immediate surroundings, for venturing out to experience knowledge, is important. While there may be obstacles on the path to international exposure and global outlook, they must be looked at as new challenges and opportunities meant for development.GI



# **Retracing PHWs**

The Cigarettes Act of 1975 introduced the first 'text only' health warning i.e. 'Cigarette smoking is injurious to health' in India.

SThe first set of health warnings were notified in July 2006 and were to come into force from February 1, 2007. However, after much delay, a set of very mild images covering 40% of the principal display area of tobacco products were implemented from May 31, 2009.

New field-tested, stronger warnings were notified in March 2010 for depiction from June 1, 2010. However, these were delayed to Decem-

# **Impact of large** PHWs on youth

A study amongst youth in Canada and UK shows that pictorial warnings make smoking less attractive.

A study in India shows that warnings with pictures are more likely to draw attention and improve memory for the accompanying text.

SIn a survey conducted in Mexico, it was found that pictorial warnings featuring graphic depictions of the disease were significantly more effective on young smokers than text only warnings.

(Solution) In a survey conducted under the International Tobacco Control Policy Evaluation Project in China, it was found that the youth rated pictorial warnings as the most effective means to arrest smoking.<sup>G</sup>

& A new set of warnings were notified on May 27, 2011 to be implemented from December 1, 2011. Following a controversy over the notified warnings, revised warnings were notified on September 27, 2012 to be implemented April 1, 2013 onwards. &In February 2014, the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare constituted an expert committee to study global standards on PHWs and suggest field

tested warnings for notification.

Based on the committee's suggestions, MoHFW amended the packaging and labelling rules and notified the new set of rules on October 15, 2014 with 85% pictorial health warnings to be implemented from April 1, 2015. However, considering the rules, the committee on subordinate legislation (Lok Sabha) in its interim report recommended, delaying the implementation after intense pressure from the tobacco industry.

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SFor now, the 85% field tested pictorial warnings, which would have put India in a position of international leadership, have been put on hold.GI

# World trends

Solution Canada was the first country to implement health warnings on cigarette packets in 2000. 8 Brazil, leading the global pro-

duction and export of FCV tobacco covers 100% of the front side of the tobacco packs with PHW.

Slobally, nearly 80 countries require PHWs on tobacco products, among which 60 countries require the warnings to cover more than 50% of the packet, whereas countries with the largest warnings are in the South East Asia Region (Nepal 90%, Thailand 85%, Pakistan 85% & Sri Lanka 80%). Australia leads the world with plain packaging of tobacco products with PHW's covering 82.5% of the display area. 8 In 2010, a report by the Canadian Cancer Society on PHWs ranked India at 100th position in comparison to other countries vis-à-vis warning labels. The rankings further plummeted to 122nd position in 2012 and to 136th in 2014.

first cigarette or use tobacco after watching their favourite actor smoke or use tobacco on screen. Tobacco companies know this

fact and promote their products in films based on this.

ln a bid to enhance their social profile, tobacco industry sponsors various events like school competitions, bravery awards, fashion events, etc. Tobacco companies sponsor contests, which often require the purchase of tobacco products to

enter the competitions. Prizes include cash prizes, gold, key chains, cars, etc.

ln India, tobacco companies give away free samples of tobacco products in public places like shopping malls, rock concerts and discos.







I thank you for my friends, who showed me the meaning of unparalleled and unconditional love and who, I intend to cherish for life.



# Date puran poli

## Ingredients

Whole wheat flour	1 cup
Milk	6 tbsp
Deseeded and finely	chopped date
(khajur)	<sup>3</sup> ⁄4 cup
Roasted and coars	sely powdered
sesame seeds (til)	2 tbsp
Brown sugar	<sup>1</sup> /4 cup
Ghee	1-2 tbs

# Method

- Mix the flour and milk to make a dough and keep it aside for 15 mins. Mix *khajur*, sesame seeds, brown sugar and milk to make the filling.
- Roll out a portion of the dough into

a small circle using a little whole wheat flour for rolling.

- Place a portion of the filling in the centre of the circle and bring the edges together to seal it tightly.
- Lightly press the sides using your fingers and roll out into a big circle, using wheat flour.
- Heat a non-stick *tava* (griddle). Cook the puran poli till it turns golden brown from both the sides.
- Smear <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> tbsp of *ghee* on each *puran* poli and serve hot.






