



ou meet at a time of great change and challenge. Our world faces an increasingly complex set of realities, from rising joblessness to growing inequality to the increasing dangers of climate change.



On the third day, the delegates were all set with their draft resolutions and the committee saw consuming discussion on the resolutions put forward by UK, USA, France and Japan.

Resolutions

The first session ended with the dele-I gates having a much clearer idea about what needed to be discussed further in agenda proceedings. The self-assured delegates came up with effective solutions on the second day and the res-

olution process embarked with the formation of three blocs.




