

Access to the sport itself might be limited but the fact remains that F1 creates massive economic opportunities, ensuring big returns on investments. According to Assocham, F1 could generate Rs 90,000 crore in revenues over the next decade and create 15 lakh technical job opportunities. India, already a big player in automobile industry has thus a lot to reap in from its move into F1. 



Amity University revelled and basked in the golden opportunity of a rare insight into F1

quick date with Mr Alex Burns, Team Williams, F1, was organized on October 31, in collaboration with the Institute of Engineering and Technology (IET, UK), heightened the excitement for motorsports at Amity University campus.

Burns, who introduced himself as an extremely passionate individual about advanced engineering, spoke at length about "The Technological Challenges of Formula 1" during the Lord Austin Lecture. Apprising the audience about the organizational culture of Williams, Burns said, "Decisions at Williams happen incredibly fast, things move at a breathtaking pace, not just the cars, but the whole business behind the cars. The main driv-



ing force behind the success of Williams is the culture of the organization."


The CEO shared that currently, more than 500 people were involved in designing and developing Formula 1 cars, and about another 100 in other parts of the business. The company is growing at a rapid pace and has earned the distinction of being a steady engineering organization.Dwelling on the advanced technology of F1 and aerodynamics, Mr Burns averred, "Williams' core capabil-



ity is around aerodynamics. The aerodynamics is there to push the car into the road, these cars generate down force, which is several times the weight of the car itself and this allows the driver to corner very quickly in few seconds."

Talking about motorsport in general and Formula 1 in particular, Mr Burns said, "In UK, motorsport is one of the major industries with an annual turnover of more than 5 billion Sterling and more than 50,000 employees. Essentially, Formula 1 is a business as much as it's a sport. Formula 1 is the biggest single sporting event. Olympics are held after every four years, but F1 happens every year from March to November."

The lecture ended with Maj Gen K.Jai. Singh- Vice Chancellor, Amity University, Dr Sanjay Srivastava- Head, Amity Business School and Dr Balvinder Shukla, Pro-VC (A), Amity University honouring Alex Burns with Amity Leadership Award for Innovation. GI



Postponing the show for a day, followed by final announcement of cancellation of the concert by the organisers, led the infuriated crowd to ransack the place, break and get through the barricades and demand the band to perform.

Vyom A, a banking executive in the city, who was excited to watch his favourite band perform live, says, "It's crazy enough that they cancelled at the last moment, but now they refuse to offer a refund!" Videos of angry fans vandaliz-

ing the stage area also landed on YouTube hours later, and fans took to voicing their opinion on Facebook and Twitter. Abhishek Durani, a bass guitarist of band Fused, posted on FB, "Metallica disappointed by the *Mismanagement* cancelled their show!" After Bryan Adams performed to soldout crowds in Mumbai, Pune and Bengaluru early this year, Metallica's show turned into a no-show in the Capital, when Delhi Police refused him an NOC, citing 'crowd control issues!' A breath of fresh air, however, engulfed the city when Delhites swayed to

Akon's voice in a heady gig by the bestselling pop singer. But with a hatrick of bombed concerts achieved with Metallica, looks like the jinx is back to haunt the deprived city!

Alas! fans may just have to live on music CDs and worn out posters before Delhi gets to host a successful music



Monuments

religious buildings, bridges, graveyards, etc. However, not all monuments can be called Heritage. Invariably structures which are more than 100 years old are recognized by the Indian authorities as Heritage. Therefore if your grandparents' house or the community temple is more than 100 years old, then it is definitely Heritage. And it must be protected. This would mean that ideally the building cannot be destroyed, it cannot be restored without permission and even then it should be restored keeping the authenticity of the building architecture in mind. Often such buildings do not even figure in government lists.

Enlisting Protected Heritage

India has many monuments under its list of protected Heritage. The list is under the purview of the Archaeological Survey of India (ASI). They have about 3600 monuments under this protected monuments list which are of national significance. Monuments which come under this category are the Taj Mahal, Red Fort, Purana Quila, etc. There are other monuments which are protected by the state archaeology department and there are several others that are not protected at all and are therefore under threat of being lost. Nobody can damage or build around these protected monuments but the unprotected ones usually are under threat due to constant pressures of encroachment,

vandalizing, etc. Other civil society organizations also work towards protecting them and listing old buildings.

Need to Protect and Preserve

Hello kids, in the last two Heritage Series, we discussed Such old buildings are required to be protected and preserved that monuments can be of many types like old buildings, because they are part of history and tell us a lot about our past, be it about the olden architecture, or how the people in those times lived or what happened during those times. It is therefore important to preserve these structures and also in their original form.

This time we would want you to find out about the place you live in. You could find out about both your ancestral home of your grandparents and the house that you live in currently. Try to find out how old is your building? Who built it? Is it a Heritage building? Is it protected by any agency? How long have you been living in the building? Donate an organ Gift a life So, life after death is a reality after all.

How else would you explain the magic of someone being able to see the beautiful world with your eyes?

What if the Fairy Godmother granted you the most amazing wish- to live forever? Maybe, not literally, but if there is one thing that can bring this wish closest to reality, it is organ donation. Donating one's organs is the best way to achieve immortality. By donating an organ, you get the chance to leave an indelible mark on someone's life. You not only have the satisfaction that you saved someone's life, but also have the knowledge that a part of you continues to live, though, in another person's body.

Give, so others can live: Organ donation is the removal of the tissues of a human body from a person who has recently died, or from a living donor, for the purpose of transplanting them to a living recipient in need of it. Transplantable organs and tissues are removed in a surgical procedure, following a determination of organs suitable for transplantation, based on the donor's medical and social history. Such procedures are termed allotransplantations. People of all ages may be organ and tissue donors. Organ donation is akin to gifting someone a new life. In simple terms, it means that people pledge during their lifetime, that after death, organs from their bodies can be used for transplantation to help terminally ill patients, thus giving them a new lease of life. It is also possible to donate the entire body, known as cadaver donation, for the purpose of organ transplantation and research.

Banking on life: Just as you bank your valuables for the future, you can bank your eyes and other organs of your body for future generations. There are two main organizations for organ donations (ca-

- Every 13 minutes, 1 person gets added to the list of people who need transplantation. Every day, 17 lose
- Each year, 1,50,000 people require kidney transplants, with only 3,000 taking place; 50,000 require heart transplants, while on an average, only 26 receive them.
- Living donors can donate the following organs: a kidney (one kidney is capable of maintaining the body function); a part of pancreas (half a pancreas is adequate for sustaining pancreatic functions); part of the liver (few segments that are donated will regenerate after a period of time).

- MOHAN (Multi Organ Harvesting Aid Network Foundation), based in Hyderabad.
- ORBO (Organ Retrieval Banking Organisation), the nodal centre for India, has been set up at AIIMS, Delhi to encourage organ donations, fair and equitable distribution and optimum utilization of human organs.

See you. How lucky are we to be able to admire the beauty of colourful rainbows, the smile of loved ones and everything else around us! For most of us, our vision is something we take for granted. But, what about those who have never seen the light of the day? It is nothing short of a marvel for them to gain sight,

which is only possible by cornea implantation surgery. How can a person who you give your eyes to as a gift forget the act of kindness! Donating your eyes is the next best thing after cadaver donations.

Eye Opener

- Anyone over the age of one is a potential eye donor.
- Poor eye sight, cataract, diseases like diabetes and asthma are of no consequence for eye donations.
- The cornea of those people who die due to unknown causes, or infection from rabies, acute leukaemia, tetanus, cholera, meningitis, encephalitis, rubella, syphillis, infectious hepatitis, septicaemia or AIDS cannot be har-

- Eyes have to be removed within six hours of a person's death; only the cornea is removed, not the entire eye.
- The procedure, called enucleation, takes less than 20 minutes.
- There is no fear of disfigurement after enucleation.
- After removal, the eyes are transported to the eye bank in special con-
- Renowned eye banks in Delhi/NCR are ICare Eye Hospital; Sir Ganga Ram Hospital; Safdarjung Hospital; Venu Eye Institute & Research Centre; Rotary Central Eye Bank; Guru Gobind Singh International Eye Bank, et al.

Myths busted: It is commonly believed

that the body gets disfigured after transplantation. This is not true. Human body is sacred. Transplantation does not disfigure it in any way, nor does it interfere with the customary funeral or burial arrangements. A highly skilled surgical transplant team removes the organ and tissues, which can be transplanted to other patients, after which, surgeons stitch up the body carefully, hence no

disfigurement occurs.

Live with Honour, Die with Pride: When your body is left behind in this world, why shouldn't it benefit other people's suffering? Organ donation is our duty, it is our ability to show compassion, it is a nation's salvation and humanity's pride. What would it cost you to give someone your body parts and that too, after death? We all want to do good while we are alive, so why not die with a good deed? Death is a universal reality- then why not die with pride? Why not die saving someone's life?

"Let the wind that blows away your ashes, breathe life into someone before their life crashes."

Rashika Sood took up the topic of Organ Donation in Youth Power 2010 and was adjudged the II Runners Up. A passionate crusader, she avers, "Organ Donation is a noble act. Why not gift a person eyesight or perhaps, 10 years more to enjoy with his family rather than burning your organs (body) into ashes? It is something everyone can do; it just needs more awareness. An appeal to my fellow students-go, sign the organ donor card and

do the world some good. And convince your family to do the same!" 💶

Reported in TOI: Globally, the bone is the second most commonly transplanted tissue after blood. However, not many Indians have come forward to pledge their bones. So far in 2011, the country's only full fledged bone bank at AIIMS has received just two donations!

Anyone, regardless of age, race or gender can become an organ and tissue donor. In your lifetime, you can pledge your organs for donation after your death, in the presence of two witnesses, and sign a



donor card. To be an eye donor, you can register with eye banks. However, if you are under the age of 18, you need to have the consent of your parent. Former Chief Minister of West Bengal, Jyoti Basu, donated his eyes for transplant, and his body for medical research. Aishwarya Rai Bachchan has pledged to donate her eyes, as have Amitabh Bachchan and Jaya Bachchan. Ustaad Zakir Hussain and Pandit Hari Prasad Chaurasia are on that list too. Are you going to be next?

Coconut Karanji



A famous sweet from Maharashtra, made especially during Diwali and Ganesh Chaturthi.

Ingredients

For outer layer
Refined flour (maida)1 cup
Semolina (rava) 1 ½ tbsps
Ghee1 tbsp
Milk ½ cur

WaterFor kneading For filling
Fresh grated coconut1 cup
Raisins (chopped)15-20
Jaggery (grated)1 cup
Green cardamom powder.......½ tsp

Method

1. Sieve flour into a large mixing bowl. Add semolina and *ghee* and mix well.


Knead into soft dough with milk and water. Cover the dough with a damp cloth and keep aside for half an hour.

- 2. To make the stuffing, roast the grated coconut in a thick-bottomed pan or *kadai* till golden-brown. Add the remaining stuffing ingredients and mix well. Leave to cool.
- 3. Knead the dough once more and divide into twelve small balls. Roll each ball out into a circle, taking care not to make it too thick or too thin.
- 4. Place 1 tsp of the filling in one half of the dough circle. Moisten the edges of the circle with a little water and fold over the other half, sealing in the mixture. Press the edges together to seal tightly. Repeat for all the other dough circles.
- 5. Deep fry in hot *ghee* on a low-medium heat until crisp and golden-
- 6. Drain well and cool completely before storing in an airtight container.

For a festive touch: Serve the coconut *karanjis* slightly warm so the delicious stuffing melts in the mouth. Serve on small cut glass or silver platters.





VS – What is the main difference between MasterChef India and MasterChef abroad?

VS – Despite being natural at Punjabi food, your fortune changed because of a dhokla?

VK – Right. I did not have a job and

VS – Are you a spiritual person?
