This Wildlife Week, Look At Large Animal Shrinking To Small Numbers

ome 50 years ago, the capital was home to over 200 elephants. Adorned with garlands, they were the indisputable symbol of royalty. Today, their number has come down to a single digit - six, so has their royal status as now they are a part of shunned, nearly endangered species trying to save the last of its own. The tale of our beloved haathi is no different across the borders either. Whether it was an outcry for a fresh lease of life for Lammie, the elephant battling loneliness at Johannesburg zoo or the four elephants still awaiting a home, following an order by Delhi High Court; the large animal with large heartedness cannot seem to find a home anywhere. So, the question remains - are we willing to ad-

Elephants have always been a part of the traditions of various cultures, often projected as deities symbolising strength and wisdom. The most obvious example is of Lord Ganesha. Various deities like Lakshmi, Brihaspati, Shachi and Indra were also known to use elephant as a vahana which represented wisdom and power. Japanese Buddhism's adaptation of Ganesha presents an elephant-headed pair who are collectively thought of as the 'deva of bliss'. In African culture, elephant is seen as a symbol of power. Sri Lanka considers elephants a national treasure and they are protected by law.

to extinction for illegal poaching of ivory. 487 kg of ivory, worth INR 12 crore in black market was seized from just one dealer in Kerala. More than 85 elephants were killed in last 3 years and such cruel actions have reduced the number of Asian elephants to around 30,000 in the world and if we do not stop, their extinction is not so far away.

Muh jhuka kar kaha chale

An elephant requires about 1.25 acres to live freely. What they are offered instead is sidewalks in Delhi, where they walk amidst traffic which to their sensitive hearing abilities is as peaceful as being at a rock concert. While most elephants bow in to this torture, some lose control. Masini, an 11 year old elephant hit headlines as she trampled over her mahout to death in Tamil Nadu. The reason? She was separated from her herd and made to live in isolation, resulting in behavioural changes. And so the wild animal perhaps was left with no option but to go wild.

Mere ghar bhi aao na

Lucy, the elephant is a six storey elephant structure in the town of Margate, England. What the Eiffel Tower is to Paris is what this elephant is to the town of Margate. To say that the animal is in the loved and lost category wouldn't entirely be true. To create awareness about the 'right to passage' for elephants who are the victims of industrialisation infringing their habitat, Wildlife Trust of India, Ministry of Environment, and various NGOs came together to organise 'Gaj Mahostav', a 4 day event in New Delhi in August. The geographical range for elephants has shrunk by 70% since 1960s in India and to combat that the event saw 101 installations of elephants, film screenings, artworks, concerts and dance performances which promoted respect for elephants.

Environment-friendly trains launched

Germany has become the first country in the world to introduce two Coradia iLint trains which will run on hydrogen. It is an alternative to the trains that run on diesel and pollute the atmosphere. The route map for the trains runs along a 62 mile corridor and it generates electricity via chemical reactions between hydrogen and oxygen. The trains are considered zero emissions as they only release steam and water.

Toxic tyres removed from sea A team of divers assembled to lift the artificial reef made of more than ten thousand old car tyres from the sea in south of France. The decision was taken after it was observed that the reef was spreading pollution in the sea with its toxic chemicals. The total cost of the operation is over a million Euros, funded by tyre manufacturer, Michelin and the French state.


Beta tumhari bhalai chahte hai Every family has 'hard on the outside, soft on the inside' parents.

Day 1


The workshop commenced with an introductory speech by Dr Sumit Narula, sharing the details, through an ice breaking session

What If The Reality That We Have Been Living Is Actually A Computer Game?

s I put MySims to sleep, my mind started to wander on a venture of its own. My midnight epiphanies, accelerated by cups of coffee, proposed that everyone complains about the daily monotony they have to repeat over and over again. But what if we're the pixilated puppets in the hands of intrigued puppeteers, amusing themselves with our seemingly trivial matters? If we're able to create simulation universes and control virtual characters, isn't it possible for post-human evolved organisms to do so as well or to do even better?

The Hypothesis

Simulation hypothesis is a belief which proposes that all the reality, including earth and the universe is in fact a computer simulation. It argues that the world is a simulated reality, a proposed technology that would seem realistic enough to convince its inhabitants that the simulation was real. There is a long philosophical and scientific history to this underlying thesis that reality is an illusion. It can be traced back to butterfly dream of Zhuangzi, or the Indian philosophy of Maya. The idea of simula-



tion hypothesis has also gained a lot of attention because of prominent figures like Elon Musk openly discussing the idea. Philip K Dick, a sci-fi writer, already believes that we live in a simulation. Ray Kurzweil, computer scientist and futurist believes that we can download our consciousness into a silicon device, making us all a form of digital information. Oxford lecturer Nick Bostrom thinks we are artificially simulated consciousness living inside such a simulation already!

Sci-fi or reality?

Simulation hypothesis is not something completely unheard of as the concept has been explored and popularised by various fictional movies, TV shows, and books. Starting from Simulacron-3, a 1964 novel by Daniel F. Galouye to the movie Total Recall (1990) to Matrix (1999) and so many more that we have lost count; the idea has been explored in various fictional works, making it a part of popular consciousness. Various video game designers and computer scientists argue that the possibility of this idea is not that crazy. Using Quantum Physics, they provide various questions about the objective and subjective nature of reality. They believe that such a civilization could exist which is centuries ahead of us in terms of science and technology.

generation will create such high resolution simulations that the difference between reality and video games will get nullified. Today's virtual reality is already extremely advanced and these new generation video games give an illusion of a 'free world' with more open spaces and grounds to cover unlike the old world Pac-Man and its likes. But these illusions only seem free, which presents a question that our 'free world' might not truly be free at all. There are also a lot of Eastern traditions which have ideas that are actually pretty consistent with this hypothesis. Many mystical traditions like Buddhism and Hinduism teach the world around us is actually an illusion. Maya, the Sanskrit word for illusion is used to describe the world we see and *Bramhaan* is the real world. In Buddhism, the idea is to 'wake up' to recognise the world around us as an illusion. In fact, the term 'Buddha' literally means 'awake'.

So, the real question remains of what we think because until we get a solid answer, we can only continue to create different hypotheses and have these midnight epiphanies. Maybe our puppeteer wants our simulation to raise questions.



Science Experiment

Procedure

Aim: To understand how gases respond to change in temperature

Material required: Water, plate, small candle, matchbox, conical flask, food colour



Step 1 - Take half a glass of water, mix food colour in it and pour in the plate.



Step 2 - Place candle in the middle of the plate and light it using matchbox.



Step 3 - Place the conical flask over the burning candle upside down very carefully and observe.

Observation: You will see that the flame eventually goes out and water begins to enter the glass.

What Science says? The flame heats air inside the glass and hot air expands. When the flame goes off, the air inside the glass cools down. The cooler air starts contracting therefore, creating low pressure area. This low pressure area creates a pull for the water inside the glass.



They also recalled all the relevant resolutions that had been made in the past and deliberated that member states should resolve the situation in accordance with the Charter.GT



Baking powder	1 tsp

Method

Heat the sugar in a pan for 10-12 minutes. Once it begins to melt, reduce the heat and stir. When the syrup turns golden-brown, continue to cook for 2 minutes.

- Pour the hot caramelized sugar in an ungreased soufflé dish and coat the bottom evenly. Leave it to rest.
- Mix milk, eggs, milkmaid, baking powder and vanilla together in a blender for 15 seconds only. Then, pour the batter into the syrup.
- Place the soufflé dish in a large baking pan and pour 1 inch of boiling water in the bigger pan. Bake at 350 degrees for about an hour.
- Cover the dish and place it in the refrigerator overnight.
- Wake up to a fresh caramel flan and serve for dessert.




He closed his eyes to absorb the feeling, to know that it was real and he wasn't dreaming. When he opened his eyes, it was hard to believe that it was true.

Procedure

- Cut two identical pieces of cardboard in the shape of heart, which are rounded at the bottom.
- Cut out a long strip of cardboard 2 inches wide, and with enough length to cover the other two pieces end to end (as shown in the picture).
- Draw Warli art (as shown) on both the pieces and the long piece of cardboard and colour them.
- Punch holes (1 inch apart) around the bottom edge of both the heart-shaped pieces.
