Then Prime Minister Narendra Modi launched Swachh Bharat (Clean India) mission in 2014 his first year in office, the whole India rejoiced with the thought that finally, someone addressed the issue. However, what most of the 1.3 billion population did was sit back and relax, waiting for some sort of magic to happen. But, there is no magic wand for cleanliness. Persistent and collective effort from individuals and the state can bring in some change. Don't believe us? Well, small and sporadic efforts are being made across the country to make India cleaner. Read on...



Three cities namely Indore, Bhopal and Vizag have been ranked amongst the cleanest city 2017 from amongst 500 cities in India, according to the Swachh Survekshan 2017, based on urban sanitation.

Mission achieved: Tracing the stories of these three cities, a thread of commonality runs through their endeavours which is an amalgamation of state-infused effort s and greater participation by the citizens. The success formulae is to go beyond the construction of lavatories and offer equal weightage to waste management, reciprocated with efficient mechanisms.

Plastic-free district

We all know that there are 'noplastic' zones in the country, but Kannur in Kerala has become first district in India, free of plastic on a whole.

Mission achieved: This happened after several bodies like district administration and dis-

campaign in November last year with the slogan, 'Nalla Nadu, Nalla Mannu', that means a good village with good soil. The prime objective was to phase out plastics completely. Volunteers encouraged people

to start using handloom bags. And within five months, it was a plastic-free district.

Beach clean-up

Versova beach, Mumbai was declared as one of the filthiest beaches. Lawyer & environmentalist, Afroze Shah decided to take up the matter in his own hands and clean up the beach. The end result? United Nations Environment Programme in 2016 described his initiative as 'the world's largest beach clean-up* in history!

Mission achieved: In October, 2015, the plastic waste on the beach had reached close to 5.5 feet, so he, along with his neighbour started the cleanliness drive. A few more volunteers joined and they collected around 50 kgs of waste. Seeing their

enthusiasm and dedication, more volunteers joined and the Versova Resident Volunteers (VRV) group was formed. Together, they have cleared 5 million kilograms waste from Versova beach alone.

Carbon neutral

Four months ago, a small village named Meenangadi in Wayanad District in Kerala became the first carbon neutral village in India, means the village has managed to achieve zero carbon emissions.


Mission achieved: The project was initiated in 2016 and with strategic planning, help of panchayat they achieved this feat. They encouraged people to take up organic farming in and around houses and on the forest land, various kinds of trees were grown and to achieve 100 percent success an electric crematorium was also

Solid waste management

Mysore city in Karnataka sets the best example of solid waste management. As a result there has been a great reduction in the solid waste generated every day with minimal waste being sent to the landfills.

Mission achieved: A few years ago, the city began a major drive to educate its citizens on the segregation of dry and wet waste. It ensured 100% door-to-door waste collection in each of the 65 municipal wards. Wet waste is then turned into compost and dry waste is segregated into 24 categories like bottles, tin containers, etc. which is sold to recyclers.

And, by now you know how individuals and states are coming together, putting collective efforts to maintain cleanliness. Still the progess is little. 

Increase in Ageing

Both the share and size of elderly population is increasing over time. From 5.6 percent in 1996, the proportion has increased to 8.6 percent in 2011. This rapid rise in ageing will put pressure on the government to improve the current infra-

structure and social security systems to deal with the needs of ageing dependency.

Population ageing also has profound social, economic and political implications for a country. The increasing number of older persons put a strain on health care and social care systems in the country. Old age comes with lot of ailment and diseases. In case of a large number of elderly persons in the population, the country needs more health and medical
