

Babu Edakunni, a well known artist from Kerala has just achieved this marvelous feat. On the 142nd birth anniversary of Mahatma Gandhi, he has successfully captured and transformed the greatness of the legend in a 30 x 24 ft sand portrait. The artist speaks about his artistic journey, decision to bring alive Mahatma and much more

My inspiration

My father was closely associated with the freedom movement. He commanded similar respect and adulation in Kerala as Gandhiji did across India. I feel disheartened to see that today's generation is veering off the great philosophy, which Mahatma Gandhi preached, so I thought of using art as a medium to reach out to the youth.

Project Mahatma

I have collected 30 types of sands from over a dozen places across the globe that were closely associated with Gandhiji. The idea to resurrect Gandhiji took birth in October last year and it took me over a year to collect sand from Porbandar, Delhi, Kerala, South Africa and UK. I have not made any use of any artificial colour and the whole portrait has been created using different coloured sand. It is an eco friendly piece of art. I want to send out the



message of peace and love through it.

Humble Beginning

Born in the sleepy town of Perumbilissery in Thrissur district of Kerala, I learnt the basics of drawing from School of Fine Arts, Thrissur and later joined Archies in Delhi. It was during my stay in Delhi when I got an offer to join the National Council for Cultural Arts in Qatar and mastered sand paintings.

Brush with fame

The first sand painting which created ripples in the artistic world was a portrait of Ameer of Qatar, made using the soil collected from various locales in Qatar. However, it was the exhibition displaying historical monuments and landscape of the desert country that fetched me awards and adulations. This was followed by a series of beautiful portraits of national heads of states, politicians and God. Some

I would like to pass on this art form to the future generations. I plan to set up an academy in both Delhi as well as Kerala, very soon. I do not want this art form to die with me. Though, there are many artists who create sculptures using sand, there are a very few who use sand as a medium of artistic expression.







The White Flood dustrious ગજરાત

ujarat has many firsts to its credit, with White Revolution being the most significant one. Take a tour to know how the revolution changed the fate of Gujarat and India.

Operation Flood: That's another name for the White Revolution, a rural development programme started by India's National Dairy Development Board (NDDB) in 1970. One of the largest of its kind, the programme's objective was to create a nationwide milk grid. It resulted in making India the largest producer of milk and milk products.

Its Birth: After independence, India was dependent on many developed countries for many of its raw materials, including milk. That's when it was decided to become self sufficient. Dr. Verghese Kurian, better known as the 'Father of White Revolution' was the mind behind this idea, for which he was even awarded the Padma Bhushan, Ramon Magsaysay Award for Community Leadership, the Carnegie-Wateler World Peace Prize and the World Food Prize.

Initiatives and Phases: AMUL (Anand Milk Udyog/Union Ltd), a Gujarat based cooperation was the engine behind the success of this program which now has



become a mega company, processing milk to produce various milk products. The White Revolution can be broadly divided into 3 phases - phase I, II & III (1970-80, 1981-85 and 1985-96 resp), each more advanced than the previous, improving and widening the horizon of the revolution.

Objectives: Increase milk production, augment rural incomes, fair prices for consumers

Success: White revolution gave a major boost to the dairy sector in India in the late 1960s by milk improving production in rural areas through small holder producer cooperatives and moving industrially- processed milk from these small holder sources to the urban demand centers. This helped establish a much needed linkage between the rural producers and urban consumers.

The White Revolution is now widespread with many states implementing this concept with a view to improve and develop the economic and social status of their rural sectors and simultaneously linking them with the urban sector. G T



arthquakes and epidemics scare all of us, but one of the most prominent killers these days are degenerative disorders, caused by loss of any functional celltype (like heart cells, or neurons). Every year millions fall prey to it. The only ray of light so far in treating these disorders has been shown by stem cells.

Why embryonic stem cells?

•Being least developed, the entire course of human development can be studied using them. This may solve the mysteries of cancer and developmental disorders.

•Since they can differentiate into all types of cells, they can be used to cure multiple cell-type disorders like Alzheimer, Parkinson and many others. •Helps determine the toxicity of potential pharmaceuticals, thus limiting the

need of experiments, that use animals. •Can be used to engineer organs for donation, easing the donor-shortage.

Why not other 'politically-correct' stem cells?

Embryonic stem cells are the only stem cell in humans that can divide into large numbers and produce all the 260 cells of the body. Adult stem cells are limited to differentiating into cell types of their tissue of origin. Such cells taken from a donor might get rejected

by the body. When treating genetic disorders, a patient's adult stem cells cannot be used since the defect lies in all the cells of the patient. Also, exposure to the outer environment, the chances of DNA damage and mutations in adult stem cells is much higher.

Placental/Umbilical stem cells have some of the same shortcomings, but they are definitely more hopeful alternatives.

The upshot/analogy

The potential of embryonic stem cells far outweigh their shortcomings. Also ,most of the potential uses of embryonic stem cells cannot be fulfilled by the other stem cells. Other recent techniques like induced pluripotent stem cells (adult stem cells induced to give embryonic stem cell-like properties) are still in very nascent stages, which means about 10 to 20 years more than what would be required for embryonic stem cells, before they can be used for therapy. With degenerative disorders rising to colossal heights, can we afford this? GI

Remember, every big problem has simple answers; it is we who make it big. All we need to do is, look deeper and know what lies within us. GT


Joyous spirits
