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
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

#### Himalayan triumph

The most memorable performance has to be the one at Pashupati Nath Ji Temple. We were touring the location and had everything we needed - jewelry, costumes, musicians - so we thought, why not dance here? Despite the cold weather, we danced at Mansarovar on Guru Purnima. At minus 26-degree temperature, we dressed in traditional Kathak attire. But at the time we were unaware that it was at 18,000 feet. Our love for Kathak was so deep that the cold never bothered us. Unknowingly, we helped create the world record for dancing at a record-breaking height.

#### **Dazzling the stage**

Our first overseas trip was in 1983 to attend the UFTAA Conference in Paris, and even though the tour was planned for only two weeks, we continued to perform for nearly two and a half years in places like Madrid, Dublin, and London. Our motivation transcends winning; if we win something then it is great, and even if we don't, it doesn't matter. The Padma Shri Award. hasn't shifted our focus. Guruji's prediction of a National Award became a reality in 2022, adding a unique layer to our journey. At the award ceremony, we broke convention with a distinctive mudra, garnering appreciation from everyone. It was not just a recognition but a celebration of our journey. GIT

**Bharat Mata Temple** 

Location: Varanasi, Uttar Pradesh

The oddball: Unlike any other regular temple, the Bharat Mata Temple reveres the undivided Indian Map as its primary deity. Meticulously carved on white marble, the temple is dedicated to the human manifestation of the country, known as Bharat Mata (Mother India).

**History:** The temple, a part of Varanasi's Mahatma Gandhi Kashi Vidyapith complex, is a representation of India's enormous cultural diversity. Freedom fighters, Shiv Prasad Gupta, and Durga Prasad Khatri, built the shrine, which was inaugurated by Mahatma Gandhi in 1936.

## Bullet Banna Temple

Location: Jodhpur, Rajasthan

The oddball: The Om Banna motorcycle, a 350cc Royal Enfield Bullet RNJ 7773, is the primary deity of this shrine.

History: In 1988, Om Singh Rathore, lost his life in a fatal accident while riding his bike. The bike ended up in a ditch, only to reappear at the accident site even after being taken to the police station. Despite the police's attempts to secure it and drain the petrol, the bike kept returning. 

Decoding The Fresh Climate Action Plan Devised At COP28

n response to the looming concern of climate change, 200 nations collaboratively convened for the monumental climatic summit - the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change's (UNFCCC) 28th Conference of Parties. Held in Dubai from Nov 30 - Dec 12, 2023, the convention was aimed at discerning impactful solutions for climate action, with a central focus on addressing the 1.5-degree Celsius increase in the global average temperature. We bring to you the key points...

#### The commitment

COP28 establishes a global standard for climate resolution, drawing over 70,000 delegates from diverse UNFCCC member states. Representatives, including business leaders, entrepreneurs, indigenous groups, journalists, and stakeholders, joined the conference, as climate experts engaged in negotiations on climate change mitigation, evaluating each country's advancements since the last meeting (COP27) held in Egypt last year.

#### The significance

The timing of this convention could not be more critical, as the world struggles to meet the 1.5 degrees Celsius climate goal. 2023 has already confirmed itself as one of the hottest year. Adding salt to the injury were assessments that showed that the world, too, was not doing enough to contain the situation, and the 1.5 degree target would



soon become a distant dream.

#### The tasks at hand

COP28 addressed many issues, some of them for the very first time - the need to phase out fossil fuel usage and to reduce methane emissions. Other issues included global goal on climate adaptation and operation and capitalisation of loss and damage fund. Another key agenda at COP28 was to carry out a Global Stocktake (GST), an assessment of where the world is in its fight against climate change and what more needs to be done. The GST is mandated by the Paris Agreement to be a periodic exercise, the first one being conducted in 2023, with periodic assessments every five years.

#### The outcomes

#### **Choo-choo chronicles**

Taking inspiration from the rising demand for theme-based restaurants, Railicious has been functioning in the Delhi/NCR region since 2022. For Himanshu Deeya and Ankesh Verma, the creators of this unique dining concept, it is about turning dreams into reality. "Nowadays, casual restaurants with a waiter and a table set-up are becoming increasingly obsolete. People, especially youngsters, are on the lookout for different dining experiences. We thought to capitalise on the same in a bid to attract diners and came up with Railicious = Rail+delicious," explained Himanshu.



#### Fueling the engine

Crafting a unique concept like Railicious requires a mix of creativity and market research. "It's about combining the passion for both the theme and gastronomy, while staying attuned to the dynamics of the restaurant. A central panel in the kitchen houses buttons connected to each station platform. A single train, connected to five tables, navigates the mini server, and the sensor at the end of each platform automatically stops the train from going any further. The restaurant's menu has not been neglected either; our signature items include "mushroom duplex", "paneer Peshawari", and the unique "Jungli roti".

#### **Braving the switchbacks**

They say that a challenge-less story and an obstacle-free race are monotonous. "We haven't faced many challenges from our inception till now. However, if the sensor that stops the train at the end of the table malfunctions or any other technical difficulty arises, it be-

comes troublesome for the staff. We also come across children who are curious and mischievous at the same time; they are naturally drawn to the miniature trains, necessitating constant vigilance from the staff to ensure the safety of the trains. However, their luminant faces make it all worthwhile."

#### Full steam ahead

Discussing the restaurant's future, Himanshu emphasised, "No idea is too small, and no dream is too big to attain. It is only by channeling our efforts in the right direction that we've reached this point, and so can you. We do ultimately plan on expanding into other chains in the future, but currently, our focus is on nurturing our existing branches. For at the end of the day, the joy our restaurant brings to children's faces is our greatest reward. We aspire to perpetuate these smiles in the years to come, too."


## A vow of valour


