

t's that time of the year again when revelry knows no bounds and people rock the dance floor with wild ▲ abandon, welcoming the New Year with open arms! More often than not, we eagerly await the wintry chill that gives us an opportunity to strut around in fancy jackets bought in Europe and America! We cannot imagine winters without heaters and sweaters, jackets and shawls, scarves and caps, hot soups and moisturizers, and of course, gajar ka halwa! Whew! What a long list!

While we enjoy the advent of a brand New Year with glee, how many of us spare a thought for the millions for whom the winter season is not a minor discomfort to be borne nor is it something to look forward to?

Braving the chill: Do you know that over 1.4 lakh people live on the streets in Delhi and around 100 die in the killing cold wave almost every year? The Capital shivers at 1-2 degrees Centigrade when the most ruthless cold waves hit. Those on the street resort to burning paper, dried leaves and wood to make bonfires to keep themselves warm. They even experiment with drugs and alcohol to keep them warm! Smoking and drinking is one of the most common ways used to avoid feeling too cold. It was indeed an eye-opener for us when we decided to talk



to a few people on the street one cold winter morning in the New Year.

Terribly overdressed! Snug in your warm wooly sweaters? Believe me! You are one of the luckiest people in India. We felt terribly overdressed while approaching a cluster of tin shanties and sheds near village Chakkarpur in Gurgaon. The air was thick with smoke as women cooked their morning meals on earthen stoves out in the open. The atmosphere was filled with gloom and people were not willing to speak to us initially. We were told that the small community was mourning the death of an infant who couldn't survive the bitter cold the previous night.

Basic instincts: Mansi Hasan, who claimed to be in her early twenties, married to a rickshaw-puller, lives in a crammed shed shared by three families. While her husband strives to eke out a decent wage of about Rs.100 a day, she works in two houses as a maid but earns very little. Our efforts to point out to them that burning green

twigs and leaves was harmful to the environment were met with blank stares and indifferent shrugs. One can't really blame them- their own survival was far more important to them than saving the environment.

Little things: Moved by their plight, the Interact club of AIS-46, Gurgaon have made a commendable effort to improve their miserable conditions by donating woollen clothes, shoes and blankets contributed by the students of the school. However, our efforts seemed to be just a drop

What is it that we can do to help them? Maybe if each one of us goes without our New Year parties or a couple of treats during the year, we could contribute that amount to an NGO actively involved in their upliftment and help save or improve someone's life.

Isn't it a resolution which should top our list of New Year's resolutions? Give it a thought!

vive years in a row, Delhi has been the uncrowned leader in crime. The national capital occupies the top slot for almost all violent crimes including murder, rape, dowry death, molestation, kidnapping and abduction. Delhi seems to be gripped in a crime wave. A whopping 53,244 criminal cases - including 467 murders, 581 rapes, 1764 dacoity and other heinous crimes, go unnoticed or remain unsolved. They came, ruled prime time slots and then relapsed into convenient amnesia. When I spoke to school mates, one student remarked, "Media is a small child, left alone in a room made of candy. It starts licking the floor and soon has its feet stuck in the very thing it craves for." However, in this dark underground bunker, there are shards of light too. The

conviction of Manu Sharma by the Delhi High Court in the Jessica Lal murder case redresses a gross miscarriage of justice. It will certainly reinforce public faith in the capacity of the criminal justice system for self-correction. We, as citizens of India, revel in such successes of democracy. Yes, the Aarushi murder, Nithari scandal and kidney scam cases have disappeared off stage, but don't you see- you, I and the spotlight are following!







he arrival of Dolly, the much-celebrated sheep aroused the world's interest. Dolly, signified a major breakthrough, raising several interests and concerns because of its scientific and ethical implications.

The success of Dolly brought to light the concept of Cloning. In a lay man's terminology, cloning is the process of creating an identical copy of a living being. It may be an organism or cell (cell cloning) or DNA fragments (molecular cloning). It is used by researchers in Human Genome projects, where scientists use technology to multiply a single common ancestor gene, cell or an or-

While Dolly signified only one aspect of cloning, there are different types of cloning technologies that have other purposes besides producing the genetic twins of organisms.

Therapeutic cloning: Also called 'embryo cloning', it refers to a particular procedure which produces cells, specific body parts and organs to be utilized for medical purposes. The goal is to harvest stem cells that can be used to study human development and treat diseases. The extraction process however destroys the embryo, which raises a variety of ethical concerns. Scientists hope to generate an organ or tissue that is a genetic match to the recipient. It would also check the illegal organ trade in the medical industry.



DNA Cloning: Refers to the transfer of a DNA fragment of interest from one organism to a self-replicating genetic element such as a bacterial plasmid. The DNA of interest can then be propagated in a foreign host cell.

Reproductive Cloning: This is a technology used to generate an animal that has the same nuclear DNA as another currently or previously existing animal. Dolly was created by this technology. Some day, it may be used to produce whole human organs from a single cell that can replace damaged or degenerated cells and enabling humans to find a cure for many incurable diseases.

Noning flouts nature's tried-and-true "birds and bees' techniques of reproduction. While reproductive cloning is advocated by few, Therapeutic Cloning, faces ethical questions. Therapeutic cloning does not strive to make whole humans. Because embryonic stem cells can grow into any body cell, they might be cultured into nerve cells, skin cells, even hair follicles for the bald. But,

as it seems, there are too many odds. The opposition is mainly due to the prospect of creating new human life solely to be exploited and destroyed in this way has been condemned on moral grounds by many as displaying a profound disrespect for life. However, medical ethicists argue that, anyone who says that the chance to save a life through therapeutic cloning is wrong, would have to explain why they have not been upset by the practices that go on under IVF (in-vitro fertilisation) which **Cloned Baby:** a simple task for scientists

When Dolly, the sheep was cloned, it was a step forward in science at the fact that science can be used to create exact replicas of animals! The question rises: Can humans be cloned? Scientists at the U S Biotech Company, Advanced Cell Technology believe that a human baby can be cloned.

An American team produced a baby mouse from genetically altered skin cells of adult species. The team inserted reprogrammed skin cells from an adult mouse into mice embryos to create off springs. Hence it is possible to take a human cell, reprogram it back to its embryonic state and then insert it into an early human embryo to produce 100% clones!

So, for us it's a new beginning where we might see people sharing same features and faces like us.

is basically the same thing. Another argument is that Therapeutic Cloning should be opposed on the "grounds of risk of misuse", such as selling of labcreated embryos without the approval of their biological parents. The potential for abuse is unimaginable. Also, if you get your own cells back in an attempt to repair a disease with genetic roots, you would be only restoring the disease. Health Organisations have demanded that cloning be banned until ethical and safety issues are resolved.



I can already see the New Year unleash a fighter's spirit in the young ones.




wake of a terror attack which did not, at least, affect them. But yes, again next time, if assured that no such announcements would be made, they will come back to light a candle.

One such occasion that calls for revelry and celebrations is the New Year. Though Hinduism is followed by the largest percentage of people in India, even within the Hindu community it is not celebrated at the same time of the year and in the same fashion. New Year dates of many religions coincide with each other

Nabo Barsho

In West Bengal, Nabo Barsho (New Year) is celebrated during spring. The Brahmaputra valley is green and cuckoos sing in the woods. Fragrant flowers and orchids bloom. People decorate their houses with colorful flowers. Women wear yellow clothes as it is symbolic of spring.

Bitter 'n' sweet Ugadi

In Karnataka and Andhra Pradesh too, New Year is celebrated in the spring. In Telgu New year known as 'Ugadi', family members and friends sit together for the traditional sauce called Ugadi pachchadi. On this day, it is customary for people to eat a small helping of a salad made of neem leaves, jaggarey, raw mangoes and bananas. By eating this, the person is symbolically accepting everything bitter and sweet that is likely to come his way throughout the year. In Kerala, on the night before New Year's Day, mothers prepare a special tray consisting of special food, fruits, flowers and gifts. This tray is the first thing that one should see on New Year's Day. So, as soon as the children are awake,

they are led with their eyes closed to the tray.

Festival of lights

In Gujarat, New Year coincides with Diwali, an important Hindu festival. Religious fervour paralleled with ample fun and merry-making marks the festival. People light oil lamps around their houses to welcome God, so do the people of Uttar Pradesh. Hindu new year is celebrated with the very first day of Kartik month following Diwali Amaavasya and is popularly known as Vikram Samvat. It is believed that Goddess Laxmi comes to bless each house. People pray to the Goddess to bring them good luck and fortune.

Kashmiri Navreh

Navreh is the lunar new year celebrated in Kashmir and many other parts of the country. This coincides with the first day of the Chaitra (spring) Navratras. It is observed as the New Year's day in Andhra Pradesh and Karnataka (as Ogadi), in Maharashtra and Goa as (Gaudi Parva), by Sindhis as Cheti-Chand and in the northern parts of India as Chaitra Shukla Di i.e. the first day of the lunar fortnight of Chaitra. In Kashmir, on the eve of Navreh the Kulguru of a Pandit family gets a new almanac and an illustrated scroll. Late in the evening, the housewife gets a big plate and fills it up with rice or paddy, the new almanac and scroll are placed on the rice. Early morning on the New Year day, a boy or a girl gets up at dawn and, after taking the lid off the plate, takes it to the head of the family and his wife and

then to others in such a way that every member of

the family gets a glimpse of the things kept in the

plate and looks into the mirror as the first thing in

the morning. This signifies as prayer for food,

wealth and knowledge in the coming year.

Dance fest

Bohag Bihu, the Assamese national festival marks the beginning of a New Year. It is actually a dance festival where special Bihu dances and songs are performed. Gudi Padwa is Maharashtrian New Year - Gudi that is Brahmdhwaj or Flag of Lord Brahma is hung at doors of each house. People clean & paint houses, perform prayers and create beautiful *rangoli*.

Baisakhi – the harvest new year of Punjab

y earliest memories of Baisakhi are those of flying kites with my cousin on the terrace of my uncle's house in Chandigarh, eating the rich 'kada prasad' dripping with pure ghee and dancing to the tune of Punjabi folk songs.

Celebrated on the 13th of April, Baisakhi is essentially a harvest festival and New Year rolled into one for the large farming community of **Punjab**. The grueling task of harvesting the rabi crop is rendered light by merry community festivities in ful-

fillment of the year long hard work of the farmers. What amazes any visitor to Punjab at this time of the year is the lush green bounty of nature. Added to this, the bright colours of the traditional attire of the people. Men and women perform 'bhangra' and 'gidda' the popular folk dances.

The festival holds a special meaning for the Sikhs. It was on this day in 1699, that the tenth Guru Gobind Singh organized the 'Khalsa panth'. Guru Arjun Das was martyred by the Muslim rulers on this day. Again, it was on this day in 1875, that Swami Dayanand Saraswati founded the Arya Samaj, a sect of the Hindus that discards idol worship and is devoted to the Vedas for spiritual guidance. Gautam Buddha also attained enlightenment on this day. In the Golden Temple in Amritsar, water drawn from all the sacred rivers of India is poured in the pool surrounding the holy shrine on this day. Furthermore, the 'Granth Sahib' is taken in a proces-

sion, led by the 'Panj Pyaras' or five senior Sikhs

who are symbolic of the original leaders.

'You must visit the gurdwara in the evening when it is beautifully lit and decorated', my grandmother, a Punjabi herself, never fails to remind me. Indeed, Sikh devotees throng the Gurdwara and listen to 'Kirtans' and discourses. I particularly look forward to the 'langar' or the community lunch served by volunteers. As a child, I would often wonder why people would strain themselves to bend and serve. 'When you bend to serve, you also surrender your ego to His worthy cause', my grandmother, as always, would have an answer for everything I asked. I did not quite understand it then. But I do, now. Though most states celebrate it, to experience the gusto and exuberance with which Baisakhi is cele-

brated, Punjab is the place to be. The colourful fairs, the procession of 'Panj Pyaras' and the unforget-table taste of 'kada prasad' and many other exotic dishes can be experienced only in Punjab.

Premier League: The show continues

he multi-billion-dollar industry that is the Barclays Premier League is in full swing. While last season was generally regarded as having been the best for years, the 2008-09 promises to be grander and more entertaining than ever.

English Premier League

Promoted as "The Greatest Show On Earth", the Premier League is the world's most popular and most watched sporting league, followed worldwide by over half a billion people in 202 countries. Regarded as the world's best league football competition, most watched and richest, it is contested by 20 member clubs that act as shareholders. The season runs from August to May, with

teams playing 38 games each. It comes under the jurisdiction of the Football Association (the FA), a member of UEFA affiliated with the world's governing body - the Federation of International Football Associations (FIFA).

History

The 1980s saw a nadir in English football. Stadiums were crumbling and hooliganism was rife. English teams were banned from Europe following the death of 39 fans at Heysel Stadium in Belgium. In 1989 over 100 fans died during the FA Cup semi-final. Lord Justice Taylor recommended a complete overhaul in the way football grounds were run and structured. A radical restructuring

was needed if English clubs and the game in general were to develop and flourish. In 1991, The Founder Members Agreement was signed for the setting up of the Premier League, independennt from the Football League and FA, leaving it free to organise its own broadcast and sponsorship agreement. On 20th February 1992, it was established as a limited company.

Commercial Calls

Television Rights assigned for the first time by the league saw the value of the Premier League soar. From the initial deal of £191million, Sky and Setanta have paid a staggering £1.7billion. Sponsorship has played an enormous role. In 1993 Carling paid £12million and the competition became known

as the FA Carling Premiership. In 2001 Barclaycard paid £48million, and renewed the same in 2007 with £65.8million for three seasons of Barclays Premier League.

Ticket to UEFA

The top two sides in the Premier League qualify automatically for the UEFA Champions League, going straight through to the group stage. The teams that finish third and fourth qualify for the UEFA Champions League but must play in the 3rd qualifying round - the winners of these matches are then admitted to the group stage. The fifthplaced team qualifies for the UEFA Cup, as do the FA Cup winners and the Carling Cup winball to tackle social exclusion, raise educational standards and promote community involvement.

FAQs

Over 200 countries show Barclays Premier League matches on television.

50 per cent of total money goes on an equal share basis to the 20 Premier League clubs, while relegated clubs also receive some of this money in the form of a parachute payment.

25% of the money is paid as facility fees, which are determined by the number of appearances on tele-

Seven clubs namely Arsenal, Aston Villa, Chelsea, Everton, Liverpool, Manchester United, and Tottenham Hotspur have been members since its inception.

TANZI! What is the first thing which strikes your mind on hearing this word? A dish? Maybe from China or Japan? That's the thing, which I thought. But when I went deep into this sport, I got to know that it is a traditional Asian game in which players aim to keep a heavily weighted shuttlecock in the air using their feet and other parts of the body (but not hands). The game, which goes by many different names, may be rules, based on a court similar to badminton, or played artistically, among a circle of players in a street or park, with the objective to keep the shuttle 'up' and show off skills. In Vietnam, it is known as da cau and is the national sport, played especially in Hanoi.

History

The first known version of Jianzi was in the 5th century BC in China. The name ti jian zi, means simply 'kick shuttlecock' ('ti' = kick, 'jian zi' = little shuttlecock). The game is believed to have evolved from

cuju, a game similar to football that was used as military training. Over the next 1000 years, this shuttlecock game spread throughout Asia, acquiring a variety of names along the way. Jianzi came to Europe in 1936, when a Chinese athlete from the province of Jiangsu performed a demonstration at the 1936 Summer Olympics in Berlin. In Germany and other countries people began to

learn and play the sport, now called 'shuttlecock'. The sport continues to receive greater recognition, and was included as a sport in the 2003 Southeast Asian Games and in the Chinese Games. Vietnam and China are generally considered best, while in Europe, Hungary and Germany are the strongest.

The Game

The shuttlecock, called a 'jianzi' in the Chinese game and 'Chinese hacky sack' in English, typically has four feathers fixed into rubber sole or plastic discs. Some handmade jianzis make use of a washer or a coin with a hole in the centre. During play, various parts keep the shuttlecock from touching the ground. It is primarily balanced and propelled upwards using parts of the leg, especially the feet. Skilled players may employ powerful and spectacular overhead kicks. The sport builds hand-eye coordination and is also good for brain. Besides, it's convenient to play, requiring only a very small area,

Competitively, the game is played on a rectangular court 6.10 by 11.88 metres, divided by a net (much like badminton) at a height of 1.60 metres (1.50 metres for women).

Official jianzi competitions

The official featherball used in the sport of shuttlecock consists of four equal-length goose or duck feathers conjoint at a plastic base. It weighs approximately 15 grams. The total length is 15 to 18 cm. The feathers vary in colour, usually dyed red, yellow, blue and/or green. However, in the Official Jianzi Competitions, a white featherball is preferred.

I recently played the game, 'Harry Potter and the Order' of the Phoenix (HPOP). Being a wizard, Potter has some basic spells at his disposal. These, are for the most of the part, introduced to you over the course of the game and involve moving the mouse in certain simple patterns to cast them. The basic spells

include reparo, accio, depulso and the grand staircase with its moving wingardium leviosa. However, much of your time will be spent in casting basic spells rather than combat spells, so don't get your hopes up. This is be-

cause the game isn't about action, but about using spells to solve mini-puzzles, thereby earning skill points that will boost the power of your spells. While the mini-puzzles are interesting at first, they soon become repetitive. A case in point is

stairs and the numerous portraits on the walls – they are beautifully done and go a great way in adding atmosphere. Some of the portraits offer hidden passages. There are hidden treasures and secrets littered around that can be unlocked using spells.

You spend much of your time repairing stuff, or levitating objects into place or other mundane tasks that slowly numb your brain with their monotonous regularity. The graphics are fairly good (when tested on Nvidia GeForce 8800 GT), but are not next generation by any earthly standards and are especially poor during the ingame cut scenes. The sound and voice are much better, thanks mostly to the fact that the original actors have lent their voices in the game.
