As per a study by the British Youth, this is the drowsy reality of a fifth of teens across the globe who all wake up at night to check their social media. So, yes, when it comes to having damaging effects, reels do eat and leave no crumbs. Statistics from Microsoft go as far as to reveal that short form content has led to a startling decrease in human attention spans,

plummeting it to eight seconds. Not to mention the half information/fabrication epidemic it has unleashed! The reeling rumour mill might have made you believe that pimples can be cured with a simple application of toothpaste, haven't they? The sidelining of originality in the name of trends is yet another annihilating impact. The millions of dancing videos and dance challenges are proof that we would go as far as to replicate the same thing over and over again to be on-brand. Limiting your screen time can be a good place to start, if you really want to stop your life from becoming moye moye, that is.



World Happiness Report

According to the UN World Happiness Report 2024, Finland has retained its

position as the world's happiest country for the seventh consecutive year. Other Nordic countries like Denmark, Iceland, and Sweden followed closely behind, ranking high on the happiness index. On the contrary, Afghanistan ranked last due to the ongoing crisis since Taliban regained power. After more than a decade, USA and Germany dropped out of the top 20. India ranked 126th in the happiness index, the same as last year.







RUSSIA

Putin's historic win

President Vladimir Putin has cemented his tenure for the next six years with a historic 87% sweep during the recent presidential election. As per election officials, the nationwide turnout was at 74.22%, exceeding the 67.5% turnout of 2018 elections. Contender Nikolai Kharitonov is said to have come in second with under 4% votes, Vladislav Davankov third, and Leonid Slutsky fourth. With such a result, Putin is set to surpass Stalin to become Russia's longest-serving leader in more than 200 years, granted he completes the term.



company Reddit, known for housing web forums on various topics, has gone public as one of the most highly anticipated IPOs of the year. According to a corporate filing, the company aimed to raise around 750 million USD where around 22 million shares were set to be sold in the range of 31-34 USD per share. Reddit also set aside around 1.76 million shares just for Redditors, the platform's users who created their accounts before Jan 1. Reddit's IPO is the first social media IPO debut since Pinterest went public in 2019.







C PAKISTAN

Explosion in coal mine

At least twelve miners have died in a methane gas explosion in a coal mine in Harnai. The workers were trapped about 240 metres underground in the cave-in. Rescue operations worked overnight to save about eight workers as well as the bodies of the deceased. The unions of miners have blamed the hazardous working conditions and lack of safety implementations as the major cause of the accident.





INDIA

Startup Mahakumbh 2024

The Startup Mahakumbh, a threeday event supported by the Department for Promotion of Industry and Internal Trade to boost the startup ecosystem, was held at Bharat Mandapam, New Delhi. Organised by Bootstrap Incubation & Advisory Foundation and Indian Venture and Alternate Capital Association, the event witnessed PM Narendra Modi addressing entrepreneurs, investors, and innovators.





INDONESIA

Subianto as new president

Prabowo Subianto, Indonesia's defence minister, has finally been declared as the winner of the presidential election after rivals alleged fraud in the results. He was declared winner against the two former governors who vowed to contest the results in court over alleged irregularities. Despite this, he won the seat with 58.6% votes. Around 300 demonstrators with banners and signs protested against the outcome.





SOUTH KOREA

Green financing

The government has assured to allocate 420 trillion KRW towards green financing to fund projects to help reduce greenhouse gases and carbon emissions, aiming to drop the level by 40% by 2030. State-run financial organisations comprising Korea Development Bank, Industrial Bank of Korea, and Export-Import Bank of Korea will provide aid for construction of low-carbon facilities and production of eco-friendly goods.

That's celebrated Indian actor Adil Hussain and the movie is perhaps the last in his long list of glowing achievements, including global acclaim for nuanced portrayals in 'The Reluctant Fundamentalist' and 'Life of Pi'. His talent earned him prestigious National Film Awards, including Special Jury honours for 'Hotel Salvation' and 'Maj Rati Keteki'. Hussain's success extends globally, with accolades such as Best Actor at the New Jersey Independent South Asian CineFest and Prag Cine Awards. Read on as he tells us all about his cinematic journey.

Of stages and screens

Assam is a culturally vibrant place. Every neighbourhood has a theatre, music, or dance group, dolling out a variety of cultural shows. Growing up in Assam's vast cultural ambience, my fascination with performing arts was ignited by two standup performers who would visit the neighbourhood. They would imitate Bollywood stars, followed by a stand-up act. Inspired, I started out with playful imitations of Bollywood megastars and participation in casual neighbourhood plays, which paved way for my theatrical debut at the age of 8 in the play 'Capmaker and the Sailor'. This pivotal moment fuelled my passion to land in National School of Drama (NSD). While

meeting stalwarts like Barry John and Naseeruddin Shah left me in complete awe, it also stirred the feelings of lack of self-confidence that stemmed from my social background. However, looking back on NSD, I feel my love for people and my extroverted nature eased the transition and eventually became an asset even as I tried my hand in

Navigating artistic vision

As an actor deeply entrenched in cinema and theatre, I follow a fundamentally similar approach in both theatre and films, gravitating more towards scripts that depict human intricacies. My method involves extensive reading and comprehending the 5 Ws: who, when, where, what, and

why. The characters need to serve the story, possessing three dimensionality for nuanced and organic storytelling. While I completely sublimate myself to the director's vision, I infuse it with authenticity by thinking to myself, "how I wouldn't behave in this situation." My overarching goal is of a world where commerce and art share a pedestal, if not, art elevated even higher.

Authenticity of OTT

OTT productions unfold stories with ample time for character development. For instance, my participation in 'Delhi Crime' as a police commissioner required me to explore home of one of the havildars which

allowed the audience to empathise with lesser-known individuals.



Moreover, OTT engages entire ensemble and brings out talent which serves the story. The realism in OTT series stands out, distinct from the overshadowing in mainstream cinema. To nurture such authentic productions, governments should allocate budgets for development of theatre artists, as this platform is often viewed as a stepping stone to fame, when it has potential to be fulfilling its own right.

Guiding budding talent

The essence of happiness, progress, and success lies in one's passion. For me, acting is a self-indulgent pursuit driven by genuine love for the craft, irrespective of external validation. I don't consider myself as an expert, and I am not being modest about it, as I am just a facilitator, sharing from my experiences and fundamental laws. The prospective actors who want to get into NSD should know that they value a person's passion for art, originality, and openness to new ideas. NSD focuses on nurturing individual talent rather than homogenising everyone. The eligibility, however, is a graduation degree, 6-10 play experiences, and 3 teacher recommendations. While networking secures opportunities, true artistic hunger comes from delving deeply into the craft, seeking to understand every facet and continuously reinventing. This insatiable curiosity is the driving force expected from emerging artists.

Sniffling between sobs, he continued, "No matter how much I tried to convince the mischievous asteroids to stay put, they never listened and bullied me.


The science of it

A dusty old manuscript; nothing else! "A dusty old manuscript. Me? The whisperer of knowledge and the harbinger of change? Young man, you might not believe it, but I am the parchment upon which ink rolled to alter the course of history; the missive that launched the infamous arms race. I am

letter! Oh, how I wish the likes of you knew more of my origins and worth. Actually, it was 1939. I remember whispers concerning a storm approaching spread like wildfire. Szilard, in particular, chose me to be the lens, looking through which the US


me to settle everything.

I still remember how Einstein carved "A single bomb of this type...exploded in a port might very well destroy the whole port together with some of the surrounding territory" onto me. I prompted the government to act quickly to beat the German minds. Secret nuclear knowledge, consequently, became as American as apple pie. Courtesy - Yours Truly. Howbeit, I pondered over this for long, fighting my thoughts on whether this was for the good of my nation or not. For President Roosevelt relied on my words to such an extent that he instantly established an advisory Uranium Committee. The S-1 Committee, established in 1941, marked the beginning of the Manhattan Project. Led by

would get a chance to choose the right J Robert Oppenheimer, the troop of scientists started working on the first atomic bomb in 1942, giving birth to Little Man and Fat Boy, the two most hazardous inventions in history. As these were dropped on Hiroshima and Nagasaki, the results were catastrophic - nearly 200,000 were killed and hundreds of thousands more got wounded. And I bled with them; my ink turned red that day and it still does not fail to give me chills.

> Subsequently, Einstein regretted giving birth to me. "Had I known that the Germans would not succeed in producing an atomic bomb, I would have never lifted a finger," for the Nazi nuclear programme was far behind what US physicists imagined. Perhaps if I never existed, the realms of science and international relations would have been varied from where they stand today, perhaps for the better, but then who would have taught the world the lesson it needed to learn? That words must never be underestimated and that a small stroke of ink is as mighty as a nuclear bomb. The only difference is that one holds the potential to obliterate human bodies, and the other can destroy human minds or both.

From Soot To Colours

ot everyone can become a great artist but a great artist can come from anywhere. So was taught to us by the movie Ratatouille and is exemplified by Karam Sapra, a Class XII student at AIS Saket. From being featured in The Times Of India to being an admirer of all things innovative, this artist and scientist has quite the tale to tell.

The spark: Sapra was very young when he noticed that kajal could be made from soot. This observation ignited the fire of innovation in him, and he started mixing vehicular soot with oil to make painting material which could be used by artists, giving birth to his project AeroInk.

The process: And so Karam designed an attachable prototype, made of mixed alloys, that captures soot from vehicles. The soot is heated and filtered to remove impurities. Specific oils and chemicals are then added to make different inks like marker ink, printer ink, paint etc. Sapra has already filed three patents for this project.

The accolades: Karam's AeroInk has already had research papers published on it, including in international journals like the Research Archive of Rising Scholars and the Questioz International Journal. Being the top finalist for the KVRSS Spark Innovation Awards, AeroInk has been endorsed by eminent personalities like Amitabh Kant, India's G20 Sherpa and Clay Stranger, MD, Rocky Mountain Institute. Sapra has collaborated with artists from Shantiniketan and Narrative Movements to create art pieces using this paint. One such artwork was the portrait of Dr (Mrs) Amita Chauhan, Chairperson, Amity Group of Schools and RBEF.

The compassion: Epitomising the virtues of compassion Sapra has learnt from the Amity family, he has donated the entire proceedings from another project to Amitasha, an initiative of Chairperson for less privileged girl-child.





Geographical Indicator (GI) Tags

Trom the delicate Silver ☐ Filigree called Chandi Tarakasi to food products like Similipal Kai Chutney and Gucci Mushroom, India has registered more than 500 Geographical Indications as of March 2024. But what is all this fuss about these GI tags? Aisha Bhargavi, X C & Pramith Singh Gupta, X E, AIS Saket, present the answers.

Understanding Gls

Geographical Indication Tags are tags given

When the French Wine trade faced a crisis in the early 20th century, the need for GI systems arose. In 1919, the concept of GI tagging was introduced in the Treaty of Versailles and is now internationally recognised under the Paris Convention, as part of Intellectual Property Rights (now covered by the WTO's TRIPS Agreement, 1994). Further, the Lisbon Agreement for the Protection of the Appellations of Origin and their International Registration, 1958, was adopted to introduce the concept of GI as we know today. In the realm of Intellectual Property Rights, GI tags ensure that unique regional products get the recognition and legal safeguard they deserve. They act as a shield against counterfeiters

agreement, GI tags were implemented in India on September 15, 2003 by the Geographical Indication Registry in accordance with the Geographical Indications of Goods (Registration and Protection) Act, 1999. The act's guidelines imply that the product must conform to the established standards for credibility and reliability. This legislation safeguarded the user's entitlement to use the product and prevented substandard counterfeit goods from entering the market. India's first-ever GI-tagged product was Darjeeling tea in the year 2004-05.

More than a label

GI tags offer multiple benefits of a product to both producers and consumers. For producers, GI tags are an important tool for promoting traditional skills of a region and act as a valuable marketing service, allowing producers to charge premium prices for authentic products and reach a wider audience. It also prevents unauthorised use of a product's name and directly influences the preservation of cultural heritage of the product and its region. The GI tagging of the Darjeeling tea is an excellent example of producers benefitting plentifully as only the farmers were able to sell the Darjeeling tea leaves. For the consumer, GI tags assure that they're purchasing an authentic product.

to any naturally occurring or man-made product, marking their specific geographical location and possessing qualities or a reputation that are due to its place of origin.

Treasures of the land India is home to many GI

tagged items, and some of the *latest additions are:*

Gucci Mushroom | Jammu & Kashmir

This rare morel mushroom costs around 20,000 INR a KG for its unique flavour and aroma. It grows wild in the specific high-altitude forests of Kashmir.

Similipal Kai Chutney | Odisha

A chutney made from red weaver ants has been given the GI tag for the traditional knowledge and skills involved in creating this chutney while promoting tribal food.

Chandi Tarakasi | Cuttak, Odisha

A combination of two words, where Tara means wire and Kasi is design, Tarakasi is a centuries-old craft of fine silver filigree, known for its intricate workmanship.

Tweed Fabric | Arunachal Pradesh

This distinctive woollen fabric woven by the indigenous communities of Arunachal Pradesh, is known for its warmth, durability, and beautiful patterns.

Loi Blankets | Kishtwar, Jammu and Kashmir

Made from the fine wool of sheep reared in the Himalayas, these handwoven blankets are rightfully famous for their warmth, intricate designs, and long lifespan.

Chikri Craft | Maharashtra

The unique lacquered woodwork craft of Maharashtra uses natural materials and traditional techniques create beautiful decorative items.

Manipuri Black Rice | Manipur

This black rice variety is known for its high nutritional value and nutty flavour.



Securing

The process of acquiring a GI tag involves several steps:

Step 1: Application

Any group, organisation, or authority associated with the product can file an application with the Geographical Indications Registry of India.

Step 2 & 3: Scrutiny & examination

The application is examined to ensure the distinctive link to its geographical origin and ascertain the particulars furnished.

Step 4: Show cause notice

In case of objections, registrar communicates the discrepancy and the applicant is given the opportunity of being heard.

Step 5: Publication

Once an application is approved, it is published in the Geographical Indications Journal for public opposition, allowing time for anyone to challenge the claim.

Step 6: Registration

After all process of addressing any objections, the product is registered as GI.


