reading, writing, and studying mathematics were evident, and his self-esteem had taken a significant hit from previous academic difficulties. I first sought to understand his learning style, strengths, and areas of improvement. This particularly involved collaborating closely with the special education team and conducting assessments to identify his strengths and weaknesses. I further tailored lessons to perfectly align with his learning pace and style. This approach fostered a supportive and less intimidating learning environment for him."

"The biggest challenge I've faced as a pre-primary teacher is ensuring that young children are not only educated but also nur-

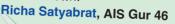
Making news interesting
